**THIS WEEK:** The Jacksonville Jaguars, riding a two-game winning streak, host Pittsburgh in a rematch of last year's AFC Wild Card Game on Sunday, October 5 on NBC's Sunday Night Football. Kickoff is set for 8:15 p.m. EDT.

The Jaguars have played in 23 nationally televised prime time games in their 14 seasons with a record of 13-10 including wins in three of the last four games. The Jaguars are 11-6 in nationally televised prime time games at home.

The Jaguars and Steelers have met 19 times in the regular season with the Jaguars leading the series, 11-8, including a 7-3 mark at home. The teams are meeting for the sixth time since the AFC South was formed in 2002, the most for the Jaguars against a non-division opponent. The Jaguars have won four consecutive games in the series (including playoffs) including a 29-22 regular season win on 12/16/07 at Pittsburgh. The Jaguars earned a 31-29 win in the AFC Wild Card Game last season at Pittsburgh in the only postseason meeting between the teams and became the only visiting team in NFL history to win twice at Pittsburgh in the same season. The Jaguars have 29 players on their current roster who played in the playoff game last season.

After beginning the season 0-2, the Jaguars evened their record with back-to-back wins in the final seconds with field goals by Josh Scobee. The Jaguars won their second consecutive AFC South game last week with a 30-27 overtime win against Houston on a 37-yard field goal by Scobee. David Garrard accounted for two touchdowns against the Texans as he threw for a season-high 236 yards and one touchdown and had seven carries for 41 yards and a touchdown run in the fourth quarter.

The Jaguars claimed their first victory of the season in week three at Indianapolis with a 23-21 win on a 51-yard field goal by Scobee with four seconds remaining. Fred Taylor (26-121) and Maurice Jones-Drew (19-107, 1 TD) led an offensive attack that rushed for 236 yards and finished with a 23-minute advantage in time of possession (41:35 to 18:25). The Jaguars forced two turnovers including a 61-yard interception return for a touchdown by Rashean Mathis.

The Jaguars opened the 2008 regular season with losses at Tennessee and against Buffalo, two teams that are combined 8-0 after four weeks. The club begins the season with eight consecutive games against AFC opponents and will travel to Denver next before observing the bye week. The Jaguars have started a season below .500 after five games only one time (2003) under head coach Jack Del Rio.

## SUNDAY'S PROBABLE STARTERS

### OFFENSE

**WR Reggie Williams** - Former first-round draft pick who had team-record 10 receiving TDs last year.

**LT Khalif Barnes** - Has started 45 games at left tackle the last three seasons.

**LG Uche Nwaneri** - Second-year pro has started the last three games. Has played in 13 games with four starts.

**C Dennis Norman** - Has started at least one game for the Jaguars in each of the last four seasons. Replaces Brad Meester who suffered a biceps injury in training camp.

**RG Milford Brown** - Seventh-year pro was signed by the Jaguars following season-opener. Has played in 51 games with 46 starts.

**RT Tony Pashos** - Joined club as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore in 2007.

**TE Mercedes Lewis** - Was club's 2006 first round pick.

**WR Matt Jones** - Leads team with 21 receptions for 244 yards. Has five-plus receptions in each of the first four games.

**QB David Garrard** - Posted 21-13 record as a starter and has led club to back-to-back comeback wins.

**RB Fred Taylor** - Played in first career Pro Bowl last year. Needs one touchdown to set franchise record.

**FB Greg Jones** - Scored club's only touchdown in season-opener.

### DEFENSE

**DE Paul Spicer** - Leads team with nine quarterback pressures. Led team with 7.5 sacks in 2007.

**DT Rob Meier** - Durable lineman who can play both end and tackle. Has played in 127 games in eight seasons and has 20.5 sacks.

**DT John Henderson** - Two-time Pro Bowl selection is the cornerstone of the defense.

**DE Reggie Hayward** - Has 35 career sacks in seven-plus seasons.

**LB Justin Durant** - Missed last two weeks with groin injury.

**LB Mike Peterson** - Leads team with 41 tackles in four games. Has not missed a snap in four games.

**LB Daryl Smith** - Led team with 16 tackles last week against Houston. Registered first sack of the season in week two.

**LCB Rashean Mathis** - Team's all-time leader with 22 interceptions including a 61-yard interception return for a touchdown at Indianapolis.

**RCB Drayton Florence** - Joined club as unrestricted free agent from San Diego. Has played in 78 games with 47 starts.

**SS Brian Williams** - Moved to safety after starting last two seasons at cornerback opposite Rashean Mathis. Has not missed a snap in four games and had first interception of the season at Indianapolis.

**FS Reggie Nelson** - Set team record for most interceptions as a rookie with five. Was inactive last week with knee injury.

## JAGUARS EVEN RECORD AT 2-2 WITH OVERTIME WIN VS. HOUSTON:

The Jaguars won their second consecutive game and evened their record at 2-2 with a 30-27 overtime win against AFC South foe Houston. Josh Scobee connected on a 37-yard field goal on the first possession of overtime, his second consecutive week with a game-winning field goal, as the Jaguars won their first overtime game since 2005. Houston was forced to punt on the opening possession and the Jaguars started their first drive at their own 41-yard line. The drive stalled after one first down and the Jaguars were faced with a fourth-and-four at the Texans 41-yard line. Montell Owens took a direct snap from center and maneuvered his way to his first career touchdown on his first career rush to give the Jaguars an early 7-0 lead. Both teams punted on their next possession. The Texans cut the deficit to 7-3 with a 27-yard field goal by Kris Brown at the end of the first quarter. Following a punt by the Jaguars, Matt Schaub directed a 12-play, 91-yard drive that ended with a 30-yard touchdown pass to rookie Steve Slaton. The Jaguars tied the score with 23 seconds left in the first half with a 46-yard Scobee field goal. Both teams scored on their only three possessions of the second half. The Jaguars wasted no time regaining the lead as Garrard hit Matt Jones for a 16-yard touchdown pass on the seventh play of the second half. The Texans answered with an 11-play, 80-yard drive with Schaub connecting with Kevin Walter for a five-yard touchdown. Garrard engineered a 13-play drive that ended with a 40-yard field goal by Scobee to give the Jaguars a 20-17 lead. Schaub and Walter hooked up again this time from eight yards to finish an 11-play, 85-yard drive, giving the Texans a 24-20 lead. The Jaguars took possession with 6:58 left and faced a key third-and-10 and Garrard scrambled for a 13-yard gain. Garrard misfired on a third-and-eight at the Texans 18-yard line, but picked up the first down on a nine-yard run through the middle of the defense. Garrard gave the Jaguars a 27-24 lead with a five-yard touchdown run, his first scoring run of the season. The Texans battled back and tied the game on a 47-yard field goal by Brown with six seconds remaining to force overtime. The Jaguars won the toss and the club faced a third-and-five at their own 35-yard line, but Garrard connected with Jones for a 24-yard completion. Garrard hit Greg Jones on a screen pass and he battled his way for a 22-yard gain to set up the game-winning field goal by Scobee.

## NOTES FROM LAST WEEK'S WIN

- The Jaguars won two consecutive AFC South games for the first time since 2005 (did it twice) and only the third time overall since the division was created in 2002.
- The Jaguars improved to 6-3 in overtime games in franchise history. Last week's game was the first overtime game since October 1, 2006 at Washington (L, 30-36) and first home overtime game since November 14, 2004 vs. Detroit (W, 23-17).
- Jerry Porter saw his first action as a Jaguar and finished with one reception for six yards.
- 2008 first round pick Derrick Harvey started at defensive end, his first career start. Harvey was the eighth overall pick in this year's draft and saw extensive action in a reserve role in the first three games.
- The Jaguars improved to 32-6 under head coach Jack Del Rio when they score first.
- David Garrard recorded his first 100-plus passer rating of the season and 16th of his career. Garrard finished 23 of 32 for 236 yards with one touchdown for a 103.1 rating.
- LB Daryl Smith had a team-high 16 tackles along with one pass defended and one forced fumble. Smith, LB Mike Peterson, S Brian Williams and S Gerald Sensabaugh played all 65 snaps on defense.
- Pierson Prioleau led the special teams units with three tackles.

**JAGUARS HAVE SUCCESS AGAINST AFC NORTH:** The Jaguars have a 39-21 record against all four teams currently in the AFC North and have won six straight games against AFC North opponents. The Jaguars have a winning record against each team: Cincinnati (11-5), Cleveland (8-2), Baltimore (9-6) and Pittsburgh (11-8). The Jaguars are 6-2 against AFC North opponents under head coach Jack Del Rio.

**UNDER THE LIGHTS ON PRIME TIME:** The Jaguars have played in 23 nationally televised prime time games in their 13 seasons with a record of 13-10 including wins in three of the last four games. The Jaguars are 11-6 in nationally televised prime time games at home. Sunday's game is the first regular season prime time game on NBC in franchise history. The Jaguars have played on NBC in the postseason in 2005 and last year's AFC Wild Card win at Pittsburgh. Here's a list of the franchise's regular season prime time games:

**29 PLAYERS RETURN FROM PLAYOFF WIN:** The Jaguars have 29 players on their current roster who played in the club's 31-29 win at Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game on 1/5/08. In addition, the club has nine starters on defense and eight on offense.

**JAGUARS IN MIDST OF TOUGH STRETCH OF GAMES:** The Jaguars open the season with eight consecutive games against AFC opponents including three of the first four against AFC South opponents. Following the Pittsburgh game, the Jaguars will travel to Denver before observing the bye week. The combined record of the club's first six opponents is 15-7 including games against two of the NFL's three undefeated teams in Tennessee (4-0) and Buffalo (4-0).

**DID YOU KNOW:** Since 1990, 19 NFL teams started 0-2 and still qualified for the postseason, including the Super Bowl XLII-champion New York Giants. The 1993 Dallas Cowboys also started 0-2 before winning Super Bowl XXVII. The 0-2 New England Patriots of 1996 played in Super Bowl XXXI, and in 2001, the 0-2 Patriots won Super Bowl XXXVI. In addition, since realignment in 2002, 42 of the 72 playoff teams (58.3 percent) began the year either 1-1 or 0-2.

**GARRARD SHOWS MATURITY:** David Garrard has led the Jaguars to three comeback wins in the last six games (including playoffs) dating back to 2007. Garrard engineered the offense the last two weeks to set up game-winning field goals by Josh Scobee in both games. Here's a look at Garrard's fourth quarter heroics:

Three plays later, Josh Scobee hit the game-winning field goal to give the Jaguars their first playoff win since 1999.
9/21/08	at Indianapolis	The Colts had a 21-20 lead when the Jaguars took possession with 1:11 remaining. Garrard connected on five of six passes for 36 yards with the last one a nine-yard completion to Mike Walker at the Colts 41-yard line. Scobee connected on a 51-yard field goal for club's first win of the season.
9/28/08	vs. Houston	Garrard had to lead the team twice in as the Jaguars trailed Houston 24-20 with 6:58 left in the game. Garrard engineered a 13-play drive that saw him complete four passes for 29 yards and rush four times for 31 yards, capping the drive off with a five-yard touchdown run. The Texans rallied back for a field goal to send the game into overtime. After the Jaguars won the coin toss, Garrard hooked up with Matt Jones for a 24-yard completion and hit Greg Jones on a screen pass that went 22 yards to set up a Scobee game-winning 37-yard field goal.

**GARRARD ON THE LATE DRIVES:** "I have heard the phrase, 'Cardiac Cats.' That is what takes sometimes in the NFL. That is how it is. You have to be prepared for it each week. I love to have the ball in my hands. That is why I play the position. I love playing it."

**FINDING THE GROOVE:** David Garrard is 79 of 117 passing for 783 yards with two touchdowns and four interceptions in the first four games. Garrard has a 60-plus completion percentage or higher in all four games including back-to-back games with a 70-plus completion percentage. He ranks second in the AFC and third in the NFL with a 67.5 completion percentage. He recorded his 16th career 100-plus rating game last week against Houston as he finished 23 of 32 for 236 yards with one touchdown for a 103.1 passer rating.

**SCOBEE OFF TO STRONG START:** Josh Scobee has hit back-to-back game-winning field goals for the Jaguars and is 10 of 11 through four games to lead the team with 37 points. Scobee, the only kicker in 2008 with two game-winning field goals, connected from 37 yards last week in overtime against Houston and hit from 51 yards at Indianapolis in week three with four seconds remaining. Scobee has made 10 consecutive field goals after misfiring from 37 yards at Tennessee in the season-opener and has scored 10-plus points in three consecutive games. He is tied with Ryan Longwell (Green Bay) and Joe Nedney (San Francisco) for most field goals made in 2008 with 10. The 51-yarder against the Colts was the third-longest field goal of his career (53, 10/24/04 at Indianapolis; 53, 10/9/05 vs. Cincinnati) and he had a 50-yard field goal against Buffalo in week two. He has been successful on a franchise-best 81.2 percent (95 of 117) of his career field goal attempts.

**MATT JONES OFF TO SOLID START:** Matt Jones leads the team with 21 receptions (5th in AFC) for 244 yards and one touchdown, the highest totals of his career in the first four games, with 16 of his 21 receptions resulting in first downs. Jones has career totals of 122 receptions for 1,636 yards and 14 touchdowns. He has started the first four games, tied for the most starts of his career in a season (4, 2006), and his 21 receptions are more than half his career single-season high of 41 in 2006. He is in his fourth season with the Jaguars after being selected with the 18th overall pick in 2005. He played quarterback at Arkansas for four seasons before converting to wide receiver in the NFL. He has 14 career touchdown receptions, four in each of his first three seasons, and ranks fourth in franchise history with a 13.4 average per reception.

**KHALIF BARNES HOLDS HIS OWN :** Left tackle Khalif Barnes looked at the schedule in the offseason and knew he would be put to the test early in the season. Barnes faced four of the best defensive ends in the NFL in the first four weeks in Kyle Vanden Bosch (Tennessee), Aaron Schobel (Buffalo), Dwight Freeney (Indianapolis) and Mario Williams (Houston). The four players have been to a combined seven Pro Bowls. Barnes is in his fourth season with the Jaguars after being selected in the second round of the 2005 draft. He has been a mainstay at left tackle, making 45 starts. "Khalif did a nice job," Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio said. "He's really been facing some outstanding defensive ends and really doing a nice job."

**TAYLOR NEARS 11,000 RUSHING YARDS; CLUB'S TD RECORD:** Fred Taylor needs 72 rushing yards to reach 11,000 career rushing yards in his 132nd career game and become the eighth-fastest player to accomplish the feat and only 18th player in NFL history with 11,000 career rushing yards. In addition, Taylor needs one touchdown to have the most touchdowns in team history with 70, surpassing Jimmy Smith (69 TDs). Taylor would become the 71st player in NFL history with 70-plus career touchdowns and only the 11th active player.

### SPECIAL TEAMS SHINE

The Jaguars' special teams unit has excelled in the first four games under second-year coordinator Joe DeCamillis as the club ranks among the best in the NFL in several categories. The Jaguars have won back-to-back games with game-winning field goals by Josh Scobee. Scobee has connected on 10 of 11 field goals and executed a successful onside kick in the third quarter against Buffalo in week two. Montell Owens took a direct snap last week against Houston on fourth down and raced 41 yards for his first career touchdown. Here's a look at where the Jaguars rank:

# JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS VS PITTSBURGH STEELERS, OCTOBER 5, 2008

**THE SERIES:** The clubs have met 19 times in the regular season with the Jaguars leading the series, 11-8. The Jaguars own a 7-3 mark against the Steelers at home. The Jaguars earned a 31-29 win in the AFC Wild Card Game last season at Pittsburgh in the only post-season meeting between the teams. The Jaguars have won four consecutive games in the series (including playoffs) including a 29-22 regular season win on 12/16/07 at Pittsburgh and became the only visiting team in NFL history to win twice at Pittsburgh in the same season. The only opponent the Jaguars have faced more than Pittsburgh is Houston/Tennessee (27 games). The teams met twice each season from 1995-2001 as members of the AFC Central where the Jaguars won two division titles and the Steelers won three.

**HEAD COACH MIKE TOMLIN:** Mike Tomlin became the 16th head coach in Steelers history when he replaced Bill Cowher on January 22, 2007. Tomlin, the first African-American head coach in Steelers history, guided the Steelers to a 10-6 mark in his first season and an AFC North title. Tomlin previously served as the Minnesota Vikings defensive coordinator in 2006 after spending the previous five seasons (2001-05) as defensive backs coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Tomlin was part of Tampa Bay's Super Bowl XXXVII championship staff. Prior to Tampa Bay, Tomlin served two seasons as the defensive backs coach at the University of Cincinnati from 1999-2000. He began his coaching career at VMI (1995) before spending time with Memphis (1996) and Arkansas State (1997-98). He played wide receiver at William & Mary (1990-94) where he was a three-year starter and was teammates with current Viking Pro Bowl safety Darren Sharper. He graduated with a degree in sociology.

**FORMER JAGUARS QB FINDS HOME IN PITTSBURGH:** Steelers QB Byron Leftwich was the seventh overall pick of the Jaguars in the 2003 draft. Leftwich started 44 of 46 games in four seasons with the Jaguars and completed 789 of 1,344 passes for 9,042 yards with 51 touchdowns for an 80.5 rating.

## INSIDE THE GAME

- Only six of the 19 games in the series have been decided by seven points or less. Two of the 19 games went into overtime.
- The Jaguars shut out Pittsburgh, 9-0, on 9/18/06, the second-lowest scoring game in the 37-year history of Monday Night Football.
- The teams met twice each season from 1995-2001 as members of the AFC Central where the Jaguars won two division titles and the Steelers won three during that span.
- CB Rashean Mathis - Has played in five career games (including playoffs) against Pittsburgh and has recorded four interceptions including two returned for touchdowns. Mathis intercepted Tommy Maddox in overtime and returned it 41 yards to give the Jaguars a 23-17 win in 2005 at Pittsburgh. Mathis intercepted Ben Roethlisberger in the second quarter of the AFC Wild Card Game last season and returned it 63 yards for a score. On the ensuing Steelers possession, Mathis intercepted a pass intended for Najeh Davenport.
- DT John Henderson - Has a sack in back-to-back games against Pittsburgh.
- QB David Garrard - Tied his career-high with three touchdown passes on 12/16/07 at Pittsburgh, his only regular season meeting against the Steelers.
- WR Reggie Williams - Recorded a career-high eight receptions for 95 yards on 9/18/06 vs. Pittsburgh, the second-most receiving yards of his career. Two of Williams' four longest career receptions have come against the Steelers, a 48-yard catch in 2006 and a 41-yard reception on 10/16/05 at Pittsburgh.

## TAYLOR OWNS RUSHING MARK AT TWO STADIUMS

Jaguars RB Fred Taylor has played in 10 games against Pittsburgh with totals of 205 carries for 915 yards and 7 TDs with two 100-yard rushing games. **Taylor owns the record for most rushing yards by an opponent at Three Rivers Stadium and Heinz Field and has more rushing and receiving touchdowns against Pittsburgh than against any other team.** He recorded 30 carries for a team-record 234 yards with 3 TDs rushing and three receptions for 14 yards and 1 TD receiving at Pittsburgh on 11/19/00. The 234 yards were the most in Three Rivers Stadium history. Taylor finished with a season-high 147 rushing yards on 12/16/07 at Pittsburgh, the most by an opposing back in Heinz Field history. Taylor was the first opposing back to rush for 100 yards at Pittsburgh since Rudi Johnson of Cincinnati had 123 yards on 10/3/04.

**FOURTH DOWN SUCCESS:** The Jaguars have converted five of their six fourth down attempts in 2008, the second-most conversions in the NFL (New York Jets, 6 of 7). The Jaguars led the NFL in 2007 with 33 fourth down attempts and 19 conversions. The 33 attempts were the most in the NFL since 1996 when New England had 34 attempts.

**“SPOONY” GIVES JAGUARS SPARK IN RETURN GAME:** Rookie free agent Brian Witherspoon, known to his teammates as ‘Spoony,’ has made his presence known in the return game. Witherspoon ranks third in the NFL in punt return average (15.8) and fourth in kickoff return average (29.7). Witherspoon, 5-10, 175, has returned all 13 kickoffs for 20-plus yards including returns of 49 and 51 yards. The 13 returns of 20-plus yards leads the AFC and ranks second in the NFL. He had a 29-yard punt return in the second quarter at Tennessee in the season-opener. He was one of only two undrafted free agents to make the club’s opening day roster. He was a first-team All-America selection in football and track at Stillman and also lettered on the baseball team. He was named the Southern Intercollegiate Conference Male Track Athlete of the Year as a senior.

**WALKER RETURNS TO THE FIELD:** Second-year pro Mike Walker spent his rookie season on injured reserve with a knee injury, but he has returned to the field in 2008. Walker, 6-2, 208, played in all four preseason games and has seen extensive action in the last three games. Walker recorded his first career reception at Indianapolis on 9/21 and followed with five receptions for 46 yards last week against Houston. He was a third round pick in 2007 after playing four seasons at Central Florida. He played in all four preseason games in 2007 and finished with four receptions for 33 yards before re-aggravating a knee injury in the preseason finale against Washington.

**SMITH LEADS DEFENSIVE CHARGE; LED TEAM WITH 16 TACKLES LAST WEEK:** Daryl Smith is in his fifth season and has emerged as one of the NFL’s elite young linebackers. Smith, a second round pick in 2004, has started 64 of 66 games and surpassed 100 tackles in three straight seasons. He assumed the middle linebacker job the last two seasons with injuries to Mike Peterson and is starting on the outside again in 2008. Smith led the team with a career-high 170 tackles in 2006, including double-digit tackles in nine games, and followed with 117 tackles in 2007. Smith has 34 tackles in four games this season, three quarterback pressures, one forced fumble and recorded his first sack of the season at Indianapolis on 9/21. He finished with 16 tackles, one passed defended and one forced fumble last week against Houston, the third-most tackles of his career.

**CONTROLLING THE CLOCK:** The Jaguars lead the NFL with nine drives of five minutes or more, rank second in average time of possession (32:45) and tied for third with eight 10-play drives through four games. The Jaguars had back-to-back drives of 13 plays last week at Houston that led to a field goal and a touchdown. The Jaguars put together an 18-play drive in the fourth quarter at Indianapolis on 9/21 that lasted a team-record 12:18 and concluded with a 21-yard field goal by Josh Scobee. In addition to being the longest scoring drive in team history for time, it tied for the second-longest scoring drive in team history for plays. The Jaguars had three of the four longest drives in team history for plays and time in 2007. The four longest scoring drives for time have each come on the road and the four longest scoring drives for plays have also come in road games. Here’s a look at the longest scoring drives in team history for plays and time:

# JACKSONVILLE JAGUARS HEAD COACH JACK DEL RIO

**JACK DEL RIO IN HIS SIXTH SEASON:** Jack Del Rio is in his sixth season as the Jaguars' head coach with a record of 47-37. Del Rio was named to the post on January 17, 2003, becoming the second head coach in Jaguars history. Over the last four years the Jaguars rank tied for fifth in regular season wins among the 32 NFL teams, with 42. In 2007, the Jaguars posted an 11-5 regular season record to earn the second playoff berth in three years, in addition to the franchise's first playoff win since the 1999 season. The Jaguars defense has thrived under the guidance of Del Rio as they rank fourth in the NFL over the past six seasons in yards allowed (301.3) and fourth in points allowed (18.4) while the offense is fourth in rushing yards (134.8) and second in fewest turnovers (119).

Del Rio is now in his 23rd year in the NFL, his 12th as a coach. Del Rio spent 11 years as an NFL linebacker and had a standout college career at the University of Southern California. He previously coached in New Orleans (1997-98), Baltimore (1999-2001), and Carolina (2002). He was the Panthers' defensive coordinator, and in his only season with the club the defense improved from 31st in the NFL to second, the biggest one-season defensive improvement in NFL history. Del Rio was the linebackers coach for three seasons in Baltimore, where the Ravens' defense also ranked second each season. He helped the team win Super Bowl XXXV over the New York Giants and coached the Ravens' talented linebackers, overseeing the development of Peter Boulware, Jamie Sharper and Ray Lewis, the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2000 and the MVP of Super Bowl XXXV. Prior to coaching, Del Rio played 11 seasons in the NFL, with New Orleans (1985-86), Kansas City (1987-88), Dallas (1989-1991) and Minnesota (1992-95), playing in the Pro Bowl following the 1994 season.

Del Rio was a starter at linebacker for Southern California (1981-84), where he earned All-America honors, was a runner-up for the Lombardi Award and co-MVP of the 1985 Rose Bowl. Del Rio is one of three NFL head coaches (Jeff Fisher, Mike Holmgren) who graduated from USC. Del Rio has learned from some of the best coaches in all of football. He was recruited to USC and played for John Robinson, and in the NFL he played under Bum Phillips, Jim Mora, Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Green. As an assistant coach, he has worked for Hall of Famer Mike Ditka and Super Bowl winner Brian Billick, as well as Super Bowl participant John Fox. Among other notable coaches Del Rio has worked with are Dom Capers, Tony Dungy, Dave Wannstedt, Monte Kiffin, Mike Tice, Tom Moore, Norv Turner and Butch Davis. Drafted by baseball's Toronto Blue Jays, Del Rio batted .340 while playing catcher on USC's baseball team in 1983 and 1984 with future stars Randy Johnson and Mark McGwire. He was a third-round choice by the New Orleans Saints in 1985 and was named to the NFL's All-Rookie team.

**TWO-HEADED MONSTER:** Fred Taylor (59-213) and Maurice Jones-Drew (38-169) lead the Jaguars rushing attack which ranks fifth in the AFC. The duo combined for 228 of the club's 236 rushing yards at Indianapolis in week three, the 18th game in team history with 200-plus rushing yards and 11th time under head coach Jack Del Rio. Taylor finished with 121 yards on 26 carries while Jones-Drew had 19 carries for 107 yards and one touchdown as the duo had 100-plus rushing yards in the same game for the second time. The Jaguars are the 16th team since 2000 to have two players with 100-plus rushing yards in the same game. They became the first running back duo in team history to accomplish the feat on Dec. 10, 2006 against Indianapolis.

### THREAT IN RUSHING, PASSING AND RETURN GAME:

Maurice Jones-Drew has shown the ability to be a threat as a rusher, receiver and returner in his first 35 games (did not play in '07 finale) as a Jaguar, averaging 81.7 yards from scrimmage and 131.7 all-purpose yards per game. **Jones-Drew was the only player in the NFL with 2,000-plus combined yards in each of the last two seasons (2006-07).** Jones-Drew ranks fifth in franchise history with 28 touchdowns in 35 games and led or tied for the team-lead in touchdowns in each of his first two seasons.   - Ranked fourth with 1,878 career rushing yards and second behind Taylor for most rushing yards by a rookie with 941 in 2006.
  - Fourth in career all-purpose yards (4,611) and fifth in career yards from scrimmage (2,859).
  - First in career kickoff return yards (1,696), kickoff return touchdowns (2) and highest average per kickoff return (26.9). He ranks second with 63 career kickoff returns.
  - Owns longest kickoff return in team history with 100-yard touchdown on 11/4/07 at New Orleans.
  - Ranked second with 96 points (16 TDs) as a rookie in 2006.
  - Holds single-season record by a rookie with 46 receptions in 2006.
  - Was one of six running backs selected in the first two rounds of the 2006 draft.
- Jones-Drew, the 60th overall pick, leads the group in several statistical categories including 28 total touchdowns and 4,562 total yards.
- Led the team with 2,014 all-purpose yards in 2007 and ranked second with 768 rushing yards. His 10 touchdowns (9 rushing, 1 return) were tied with Reggie Williams for a team-high.

## DAVID GARRARD TIDBITS

Quarterback David Garrard is in his second season as the starter after leading the club to a 9-3 mark in 12 starts in 2007 and helped the club earn its first postseason win since 1999. Garrard completed 208 of 325 passes for a career-high 2,509 yards with 18 touchdowns and a 102.2 rating in 2007. Garrard, a fourth-round pick in 2002, has played in 44 games with 34 starts over seven seasons and owns a 21-13 career record. Here are additional notes:

- Holds the franchise record with a 86.5 career passer rating.
- Set the franchise single-season record for highest passer rating (102.2) and highest completion percentage (64.0) in 2007.
- Finished with the second lowest interception percentage in a season in 2007 for any quarterback in NFL history with 300+ attempts at 0.92 (3 interceptions in 325 attempts). The lowest was 0.90 by Steve DeBerg in 1990 (4 interceptions in 444 attempts).
- Holds the team record at eight consecutive games without throwing an interception.
- Recorded a 100-plus rating in a career-high seven games in 2007 and he threw for multiple touchdowns in five of the last six games.

**WILLIAMS LOOKS TO BUILD OFF RECORD-BREAKING SEASON:** WR Reggie Williams set the franchise single-season record with 10 touchdown receptions in 2007, surpassing the previous high of eight set by Jimmy Smith in three different seasons (1998, 2000, 2001). Williams concluded the regular season with a touchdown reception in four consecutive games, the longest streak in team history. Williams led the team with a career-high 629 receiving yards and a 16.6 average on 38 receptions. He had two touchdowns for 50-plus yards in 2007, marking only the second player in team history to have two touchdown receptions of 50-plus yards in a season (Keenan McCardell, 1998). He missed the first three weeks of the 2008 training camp with a knee injury but started at Tennessee in the season-opener. He ranks third on the team with 10 receptions for 99 yards in four games.

**RASHEAN MATHIS IS TEAM'S PLAYMAKER ON DEFENSE:** Jaguars cornerback Rashean Mathis ranks fifth in the NFL from 2004-08 with 20 interceptions. Mathis recorded his franchise-best 22nd career interception at Indianapolis on 9/21 and returned it 61 yards for a touchdown. Mathis, who became the first Jaguars cornerback to be voted to the Pro Bowl in 2006, has three career interception returns for touchdowns (all on the road). Here's a look at Mathis' interception returns for touchdowns:

9/21/08	at Indianapolis	Intercepted Peyton Manning on a pass intended for Marvin Harrison and returned it 61 yards to give the Jaguars a 10-7 lead in the second quarter. Tied for the third-longest interception return in 2008.

**WILLIAMS EXCELS AT SAFETY:** Brian Williams moved from cornerback to safety this season when the Jaguars signed Drayton Florence to play cornerback opposite Rashean Mathis. Williams, who played safety as a rookie with Minnesota in 2002, has 27 tackles in the first four games and recorded his 17th career interception at Indianapolis on 9/21. He has not missed a snap in all four games. He started 29 games at cornerback for the Jaguars after signing as an unrestricted free agent in 2006. He set the Jaguars' team record in 2007 with an interception in three consecutive games.

**NELSON FINDS HIS ROLE ON DEFENSE:** Second-year safety Reggie Nelson set a team rookie record with five interceptions in 2007, tied for the most by a NFL rookie. Nelson was the club's first round pick in 2007 out of Florida. He led the NFL in the 2008 preseason with three interceptions, the most interceptions by a Jaguar in the preseason in team history. He started the first three games, but he was inactive last week against Houston with a knee injury.

**"BIG HEN" CLOGS UP THE MIDDLE:** Defensive tackle John Henderson is regarded as one of the NFL's top defensive linemen and is a menace to opposing running backs. Henderson has recorded 468 tackles (361 solo), 24.0 sacks, 125 quarterback pressures, 35 tackles for loss, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries in 99 games. Additional notes on Henderson include:

- Henderson, the ninth overall pick in 2002, earned his first Pro Bowl appearance in 2004 and returned in 2006. He was the highest-drafted defensive lineman ever by the Jaguars and second defensive tackle drafted overall in 2002.
- In 2004, Henderson posted a career-high 98 tackles and 40 quarterback pressures along with 5.5 sacks. He combined with defensive tackle Marcus Stroud in 2004 for 10 sacks, the third-best mark in the NFL among defensive tackle tandems.
- Ranks fifth in team history with 24.0 sacks in 99 career games. Has three career multi-sack games.
- Missed a game for the first time in his career at Denver on 9/16/07 with a head injury, snapping a streak of 82 consecutive games played.

**SPICER TAKES LONG ROUTE TO THE NFL:** DE Paul Spicer leads the team with nine quarterback pressures in four games including a team-high four last week against Houston. Spicer led the team with 7.5 sacks in 2007 and finished the regular season with a sack in three of the last five games. Spicer picked up his first career postseason sack at Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game. The 7.5 sacks tied for the most of his career (7.5, 2005) and ranked tied for ninth in the AFC. In addition, Spicer also led the team with 41 quarterback pressures. Spicer won the AFC Defensive Player of the Week award following the Houston game on 10/14/07 as he finished with seven tackles, one sack, one forced fumble and four quarterback pressures. Spicer has 25.0 career sacks which ranks fourth in team history. Spicer, who is in his ninth NFL season, spent portions of the 1998 season with the Saskatchewan Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League after being released by Seattle in training camp. He played two games with Detroit in 1999 before signing with the Jaguars prior to the 2000 regular season.

### JAGUARS HOUSE TWO FORMER VOLUNTEERS AT DT

The Jaguars have two defensive tackles from the University of Tennessee with two-time Pro Bowler John Henderson and third-year pro Tony McDaniel. There are a NFL-high six defensive tackles from Tennessee on current NFL rosters. Henderson anchors the interior of the defensive line and ranks fifth in franchise history with 24 sacks. McDaniel missed the final 10 games of the 2007 season with a wrist injury, but he impressed the staff with his play in preseason. ### WILLIAMS TAKES OVER DEFENSE

Gregg Williams in his first season as the Jaguars defensive coordinator after spending the last four seasons (2004-07) as assistant head coach/defensive coordinator with the Washington Redskins. From 2004-07, the Redskins ranked sixth in the NFL in defense (306.6), second in the NFC, and seventh in rushing defense (103.8). The Redskins allowed only 19.4 points per game during that span, the ninth-fewest in the NFL. Before joining the Redskins, Williams spent three seasons as head coach of the Buffalo Bills. In five of the last eight years, Williams' defenses have ranked in the top 10 in the league -- including three top three's in the past five years -- with three different teams.

**PETERSON RETURNS TO LINEUP IN 2008:** Linebacker Mike Peterson returned to the starting lineup in 2008 after missing 17 games the past two seasons with injuries and he has led the team in tackles in three of the first four games. Peterson leads the team with 41 tackles including a team-high 15 tackles against Buffalo in week two. He is one of only three defensive players that has not missed a snap this season. Peterson, who has started 121 games in nine NFL seasons, missed six regular season games and two postseason games in 2007 with a broken hand. He started the first five games in 2006 before suffering a torn pectoral muscle and was placed on injured reserve. He has career totals of 1,258 tackles, 18.5 sacks, 15 interceptions, five forced fumbles and seven fumble recoveries.

**SENSABAUGH MAKES PLAYS IN RETURN TO ACTION:** Safety Gerald Sensabaugh returned to action in 2008 after missing the final 14 games of 2007 with a shoulder injury. Sensabaugh, who has started 12 of 38 games in four seasons, made his first start of the season last week against Houston for injured Reggie Nelson. Sensabaugh intercepted Vince Young in the season-opener at Tennessee in the second quarter and returned it 23 yards to the Titans five-yard line to set up the Jaguars' only touchdown. It was Sensabaugh's third career interception and first since Dec. 10, 2006 vs. Indianapolis. In the third quarter, he partially blocked a Craig Hentrich punt.

**DEL RIO SELECTS TEAM CAPTAINS/LEADERSHIP COUNCIL:** The Jaguars have six team captains and each player has a 'C' on his jersey. QB David Garrard, RB Fred Taylor, LB Daryl Smith, DE Paul Spicer, CB Rashean Mathis and LB Mike Peterson were named captains. Head coach Jack Del Rio also announced the formation of a Player Leadership Council that will meet with him and serve a leadership role on the team. C Brad Meester, OT Tony Pashos, RB/KR Maurice Jones-Drew, TE Mercedes Lewis and RB Montell Owens along with the six captains were named to the Player Leadership Council. The captains' initiative originated with the NFL Player Advisory Council that was established in 2007 by NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell in conjunction with the NFL Players Association.

**NEW COACHES:** Head coach Jack Del Rio added four new coaches in the offseason: Gregg Williams (Defensive Coordinator/Assistant Head Coach-Defense), Donnie Henderson (Defensive Backs), Nate Kaczor (Assistant Special Teams) and Thom Kaumeyer (Assistant Defensive Backs).

**GOAL IS POSTSEASON:** The Jaguars were one of six teams that made the playoffs in 2007 after failing to make the postseason the year before. That marked the 12th consecutive season in which at least five teams (out of 12) accomplished the feat. The Jaguars are looking to make consecutive trips to the postseason for the first time since 1999. In addition, the Jaguars made the postseason twice in the last three seasons. The Jaguars are one of 10 teams to accomplish the feat, joining New England, Indianapolis, Pittsburgh, San Diego, Seattle, Chicago, Tampa Bay, Dallas and the New York Giants.

**2007 ROOKIE REVIEW:** The Jaguars had 11 total selections in the 2007 draft and eight of those players are still with the team including Chad Nkang on the PUP list and OT Andrew Carnahan on the practice squad. First-round pick Reggie Nelson started 15 games at strong safety, tied with Kevin Hardy (1996) for the third-most starts in a season by a Jaguars rookie. Nelson set a team rookie record with five interceptions, tied for the most by a NFL rookie in 2007. Justin Durant started eight games at linebacker and led the team in the postseason with 31 tackles in two games. Here's a regular season recap of the Jaguars' 2007 draft class:

■ S Reggie Nelson (1st round, 21st pick) — Played in 16 games with 15 starts. Stepped into the starting role in week two following the season-ending injury to Gerald Sensabaugh. Led team and all NFL rookies with five interceptions, the most in team history by a rookie. Ranked fourth on the team with 81 tackles (57 solo) along with one sack, 12 passes defended and two forced fumbles

■ LB Justin Durant (2nd round, 48th pick) — Played in 13 games with eight starts. Inserted into the starting lineup on 11/25 vs. Buffalo with injury to Mike Peterson and started final six games. Recorded double-digit tackles in five of the last seven games. Finished with 68 tackles (49 solo), one interception, one forced fumble, five quarterback pressures and three tackles for loss.

■ WR Mike Walker (3rd round, 79th pick) — Was placed on injured reserve on Sept. 1 with knee injury.

■ P Adam Podlesh (4th round, 101st pick) — Assumed the role as Jaguars punter to start the season and had 54 punts for a 41.6 average. Recorded 14 punts inside the 20 and had a 36.9 net average. The Jaguars finished with the fewest punts in team history.

■ G Uche Nwaneri (5th round, 149th pick) — Played in nine games with one start. Provided depth at guard behind Vince Manuwai and Maurice Williams. Started in regular season finale at Houston.

■ DT Derek Landri (5th round, 166th pick) — Played in 13 games as a reserve in the defensive line rotation. Totaled 15 tackles (13 solo) and saw action on at least 30 plays in the last five games.

■ S Chad Nkang (7th round, 251st pick) — Played in all 16 games and excelled on special teams. Set franchise-record for special teams tackles with 30. Danny Clark (2000) and Brant Boyer (1997) previously held the franchise record with 25. Had season-high six special teams tackles on 12/23 against Oakland.

■ OT Andrew Carnahan (7th round, 252nd pick) — Spent the entire season on the practice squad.

#### 2008 SCHEDULE TIDBITS

The Jacksonville Jaguars' 2008 season is highlighted by three nationally televised prime time games on NBC, ESPN and NFL Network. In addition, the Jaguars will have 11 games televised on CBS and two on FOX. **It marks the first time in franchise history the club will be featured on five different networks.**

The Jaguars' schedule features a Sunday Night game at home on NBC this week against Pittsburgh, a Monday Night Game on ESPN on December 1 at Houston and a Thursday Night home game against Indianapolis on NFL Network on December 18. The Jaguars' three nationally televised prime times are tied for the third-most in team history (4, 1999 and 2000) and most since 2000. Here are additional notes:

■ Fourteen of the Jaguars' 16 regular season games will be played on Sundays, with 11 scheduled for 1:00 p.m. ET kickoffs and three late afternoon games.

■ The schedule features four playoff teams from 2007 and six games against playoff teams - Tennessee and Indianapolis twice, as well as Pittsburgh and Green Bay. The Jaguars will have 10 games against teams that finished .500 or better in 2007, and four against division winners.

■ The Jaguars will make their first trip to Detroit since their inaugural season in 1995. Minnesota will visit Jacksonville for the first time on November 23.

**VETERAN ACQUISITIONS:** The Jaguars added five unrestricted free agents in the offseason and all five players are on the current roster led by cornerback Drayton Florence and wide receiver Jerry Porter. Here's the list:

**JAGUARS 2008 DRAFT CLASS:** The Jaguars had five total selections in the 2008 draft, the fewest in franchise history, and four of the players are on the current roster. The Jaguars moved up via trade in the first two rounds and selected Florida defensive end Derrick Harvey and Auburn defensive end Quentin Groves. The Jaguars traded their first round pick (26th), two third round picks (71st, 89th) and a fourth round pick (125th) to Baltimore to select Harvey at eighth overall. It was the second time in franchise history and second consecutive year the Jaguars traded their original first round pick.

**SMALL SCHOOL SUCCESS:** Four of the Jaguars' top defensive players along with rookie Brian Witherspoon arrived in the NFL via small schools and not the traditional Division I powerhouses. Cornerback Rashean Mathis intercepted 31 passes in four seasons at Bethune-Cookman, and was selected in the second round of the 2003 draft. Drayton Florence, a 2008 unrestricted free agent signee, was also drafted in the second round in 2003 after earning unanimous All-America honors at Tuskegee. Defensive end Paul Spicer was named Conference Player of the Year as a senior at Saginaw Valley State before working his way to a starting role for the Jaguars via Seattle and Detroit. Linebacker Justin Durant was named MEAC Defensive Player of the Year for two consecutive seasons at Hampton and was a second round pick by the Jaguars in 2007. Witherspoon played football, baseball and track at Stillman College in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

**FORMER FIRST-ROUND PICK EARNS ROSTER SPOT WITH JAGUARS:** The Jaguars obtained wide receiver Troy Williamson via a trade with Minnesota on Feb. 29 and the former South Carolina standout earned a spot on the opening day roster. Williamson was the seventh overall pick by Minnesota in the 2005 draft and recorded 79 receptions for 1,067 yards and three touchdowns in three seasons with the Vikings. Williamson, known for his speed, had two receptions for 11 yards in the season-opener at Tennessee and was inactive (thigh) the last three weeks. He finished with four receptions for 84 yards in the final preseason game at Washington with a 51-yard touchdown reception.

**JAGUARS GO WITH TWO QBs:** The Jaguars had only two quarterbacks (David Garrard, Cleo Lemon) on their opening day roster for the second consecutive season and second time overall.

**DID YOU KNOW:** The average age of the Jaguars roster is 26.0 while the average years experience is 4.91.

**ROSTER FULL OF DRAFT PICKS:** Of the 53 players on the Jaguars' roster, 45 were selected through the college draft including 27 who were drafted by the Jaguars. The club has 10 former first round picks: G Chris Naeole (1997, Saints), RB Fred Taylor (1998, Jaguars), DT John Henderson (2002, Jaguars), DT Jimmy Kennedy (2003, Rams), WR Reggie Williams (2004, Jaguars), WR Matt Jones (2005, Jaguars), WR Troy Williamson (2005, Vikings), TE Mercedes Lewis (2006, Jaguars), S Reggie Nelson (2007, Jaguars) and Derrick Harvey (2008, Jaguars).

**EXPERIENCED GROUP:** 11 Jaguars players have played in 100 or more games during their careers: G Chris Naeole (154 games, 150 starts), TE/LS Joe Zelenka (145 games, 0 starts), RB Fred Taylor (131 games, 127 starts), DL Rob Meier (127 games, 38 starts), LB Mike Peterson (124 games, 121 starts), C Brad Meester (119 games, 119 starts), WR Dennis Northcutt (117 games, 56 starts), S Pierson Prioleau (117 games, 47 starts), WR Jerry Porter (105 games, 64 starts), DE Paul Spicer (105 games, 57 starts) and OT Todd Wade (100 games, 96 starts). Only Taylor (131), Meier (127), Meester (119), Zelenka (116) and Spicer (103) have played in 100 games as a Jaguar. DT John Henderson is next with 99 games played as a Jaguar.

**2008 MILES TRAVELED:** The Jaguars will travel approximately 14,428 miles to their 10 road games (preseason and regular season), the 10th fewest in the NFL. Seattle leads the way with 34,766 miles while Cleveland will travel the fewest at 6,416.

**DE LA SALLE WELL-REPRESENTED:** De La Salle High School in Concord, California has four former players on NFL rosters including two with the Jaguars in DT Derek Landri and RB Maurice-Jones-Drew. Other NFL players from De La Salle include Amani Toomer (New York Giants), Demetrius Williams (Baltimore) and D.J. Williams (Denver). Dillard High School (Ft. Lauderdale) and Tustin (California) lead all high schools with six former players currently in the NFL.

**MEIER ONE OF 10 PLAYERS TO ATTEND SCHOOL IN CANADA:** Defensive tackle Rob Meier is one of only 15 NFL players to attend a foreign high school. Meier attended Sentinel High in West Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada and is one of 10 players that went to high school in Canada. Three players attended high school in Australia and one each from Great Britain and Panama.

**WEST COAST 'JAGUARS':** The Jaguars have eight players from California on their current roster, the most of any state. RB Maurice Jones-Drew (Antioch), OT Khalif Barnes (Spring Valley), TE Greg Estandia (Moorpark), DT Derek Landri (Huntington Beach), TE Mercedes Lewis (Lakewood), WR/KR Dennis Northcutt (Los Angeles), RB Chauncey Washington (Torrance) and LB Thomas Williams (Vacaville) all hail from California.

**PLAYING KEEP AWAY:** The Jaguars had more than a 23-minute time of possession advantage at Indianapolis on 9/21 as they controlled the ball for 41:35 compared to the Colts' 18:25. The 41:25 time of possession was the third-highest in team history and highest since 2006. In the second half the differential was 26:01 to 3:59.

## NEW RULE ADOPTED FOR 2008 SEASON

NFL teams are permitted to have one defensive player on the field with a radio in his helmet beginning this season. This gives the defense the same ability to communicate its signals as the offense.

Two defensive players will have "live" helmets, but only one of those helmets can be on the field at a time. If a primary player's equipment malfunctions or he sustains an injury, only then can a backup player's "live" helmet be used. The backup player will wear his regular helmet on the field and will have a "live" helmet stored in the secured trunk or container in the event of an injury to the primary player. At no time will two defensive players from the same team be permitted to wear "live" helmets, either on the sideline or on the field, after pregame warmups or during the game. Offensive and defensive helmets with the communications capability will be identified with a green dot.

"I think it can be good," Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio said. "It's a tool. It eliminates some of the signaling. I want to see how it holds up in terms of the radio, the coach to defense system. We've practiced the whole camp being able to signal because I just don't want to become reliant on it until we know that a 250-pound linebacker slamming into a 300-pound lineman fifty times a ball game is not going to result in a helmet that doesn't work. That's just an unknown right now for us, so we're preparing in case it goes out to be able to continue to function. There is no equity rule that if one side goes out the other side does not shut down."

**2008 POSITION ANALYSIS:** Here is a position-by-position breakdown of the Jaguars:

**QUARTERBACKS (2)** — **David Garrard**, a fourth-round pick in 2002, is in his second season as the starter after emerging as one of the NFL's top signal-callers in 2007. Garrard ranked third in the NFL with a franchise-record 102.2 passer rating as he threw 18 touchdown passes and only three interceptions. He directed an offense under coordinator Dirk Koetter that set the franchise single-season records for points (411, 25.7), touchdowns (50) and touchdown passes (28). **Cleo Lemon** signed as an unrestricted free agent in the offseason after spending the last two seasons in Miami. Lemon started seven of nine games for the Dolphins last season.

**RUNNING BACKS (5)** — **Fred Taylor** is in his 11th season with the Jaguars after being selected in the first round of the 1998 draft. Taylor has the third-most rushing yards (10,928) by an active NFL running back and ranks 18th all-time. He is the only player who remains on the Jaguars roster from 1998. Over his 10-plus seasons in the NFL, he has seven years with at least 1,000 yards and has scored 69 touchdowns. He led the team in 2007 with 223 carries for 1,202 yards and was the only NFL player to have 100-plus rushing yards in five consecutive games as he played in his first Pro Bowl. Taylor and third-year pro **Maurice Jones-Drew** give the Jaguars one of the NFL's top running back duos. Jones-Drew, who also serves as kickoff returner, ranks fourth in the NFL with 28 touchdowns (24 rushing, 2 receiving, 2 returns) the last two-plus seasons. Jones-Drew is the only player in the NFL with 2,000-plus combined yards in each of the last two seasons. In addition, he is the only player in team history to record two career kickoff returns for touchdowns. Fifth-year pro **Greg Jones** re-signed with the club in the offseason and has career totals of 255 carries for 856 yards and nine touchdowns. He had a one-yard touchdown reception at Tennessee in the season-opener and set up the game-winning field goal last week against Houston with a 22-yard reception in overtime.

**Montell Owens** backs up Jones and excels on special teams, earning a roster spot as an undrafted free agent in 2006 from Maine. Owens took a direct snap on fourth down last week against Houston and raced 41 yards for his first career touchdown on his first career rush. Seventh-round pick **Chauncey Washington** earned a roster spot after leading the team in rushing in the preseason with 39 carries for 115 yards and also recorded a team-high 12 receptions. Washington led USC in rushing his final two seasons.

**WIDE RECEIVERS (6)** — The Jaguars added veteran **Jerry Porter** in free agency and he made his season debut last week against Houston. Porter has played in 105 games with 64 starts and signed with the Jaguars in the offseason after eight seasons with Oakland. His career totals include 285 receptions for 3,945 yards and 30 touchdowns. Former first-round pick **Reggie Williams** is looking to build off his record-breaking 2007 seasons as he had 10 touchdown receptions, surpassing the previous high of eight set by Jimmy Smith in three different seasons (1998, 2000, 2001). The Jaguars used their 2005 first-round pick to select **Matt Jones** and he has recorded 122 career receptions for 1,636 yards (13.4 avg.) with 13 touchdowns in three-plus seasons. Jones, who leads the team with 21 receptions for 244 yards, has at least five receptions in the first four games. He has recorded at least four touchdown receptions in three straight seasons. Nine-year veteran **Dennis Northcutt** is in his second season in Jacksonville after signing as an unrestricted free agent from Cleveland. Northcutt, who also sees action as a punt returner, has career totals of 325 receptions for 4,094 yards and 15 touchdowns along with a 10.5 punt return average. The Jaguars drafted **Mike Walker** (3rd round) in 2007 and he missed his entire rookie season with a knee injury. Walker tied for the team-lead with five receptions for 46 yards last week against Houston. **Troy Williamson** was acquired via a trade with Minnesota on February 29. Williamson, the seventh overall pick in the 2005 draft, started 22 games with the Vikings and has 81 career receptions for 1,078 yards and three touchdowns.

- Rookie free agent Brian Witherspoon was coached by former Buffalo Bills 1985 first-round pick Derrick Burroughs last year at Stillman College. Burroughs suffered a career-ending spinal cord injury in 1989 and was paralyzed for 24 hours. Burroughs is currently an assistant coach at Alabama State.
- CB Drayton Florence played the past five seasons in San Diego after being selected in the second round of the 2003 draft out of Tuskegee. Florence grew up in Ocala, Fla., and his parents reside in Jacksonville.
- Linebacker Justin Durant was the youngest linebacker to start a NFL game in 2007. Durant was born November 21, 1985.
- DT John Henderson owns and operates a clothing store in Jacksonville, For Big Men by Big Hen. Henderson also owns an AAU basketball team in his hometown of Nashville, Tenn.
- DL Rob Meier went to Brazil in 2006 to visit his wife's family and went swimming in the Amazon. In 2008, Meier visited the Great Wall of China. He also earned his certification and went scuba diving in Jacksonville and did some swimming with sharks.
- RB Fred Taylor was recently named one of four inductees to the Florida-Georgia Hall of Fame.
- RB/KR Maurice Jones-Drew has worn a Superman tee-shirt underneath his jersey since he was 10-years old playing Pop Warner football in Pinole, California and now has a Superman logo on the sole of his cleats. A lady watching one of his games said, 'he looked like Superman the way he ran past the defenders.' Jones-Drew's late grandfather, Maurice Jones, bought him a shirt and he has continued the ritual in the NFL.
- C Dennis Norman attended classes in 2005 and 2008 at the Wharton School of Business at the University of Pennsylvania as part of the NFL Business Management and Entrepreneurial program.
- Head Coach Jack Del Rio played catcher on the USC baseball team and was teammates with Randy Johnson and Mark McGwire.
- OT Tony Pashos speaks three languages: Greek, English and German. His parents were Greek immigrants.
- Pashos was recently selected as one of the 10 greatest Illinois offensive linemen to have played at Memorial Stadium.
- LB Clint Ingram is the nephew of former Dallas Cowboys running back Robert Newhouse.
- DT Derek Landri was teammates with RB/KR Maurice Jones-Drew at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. The duo never lost a game as Landri played defensive tackle and blocked for Jones-Drew as an offensive tackle.
- RB Montell Owens earned a roster spot as a rookie free agent in 2006 from Maine, becoming only the fifth NFL player to play at Maine. Owens sent a highlight tape to Boston College, but the coaches thought he would be better off playing Division I-AA. Boston College sent the tape to Maine where they gave Owens his only scholarship offer. Owens is a musician in his spare time and is an accomplished trumpet player.
- FB/RB Greg Jones is the cousin of boxing great Joe Frazier.
- DL Rob Meier was the number one overall pick of the 2000 CFL Draft by British Columbia. Meier is one of two foreign born players on the roster (Reggie Williams, Landstuhl, Germany).
- LB Mike Peterson has a brother, Adrian, who plays for the Chicago Bears and his cousin, Freddie Solomon, played wide receiver for the Philadelphia Eagles.
- K Josh Scobee watched his mother's dream come true this off-season. Darralyn Scobee received her bachelor's degree in horticulture from Stephen F. Austin University.
- RB Fred Taylor's cousin is Pittsburgh Steelers wide receiver Santonio Holmes.

**TIGHT ENDS (3)** — Former first-round pick **Marcedes Lewis** emerged as a threat in the passing game in 2007 as he finished with a career-high 37 receptions for 391 yards and two touchdowns. Lewis was the 28th overall pick in 2006 but was hampered by injuries throughout his rookie season. Second-year pro **Greg Estandia** and fifth-year pro **Richard Angulo** return after seeing significant action in 2007. Sixth-year pro **George Wrihster III**, who is on the PUP list, has career totals of 92 receptions for 815 yards and nine touchdowns.

**OFFENSIVE LINE (9)** — The Jaguars offensive line has had a different look the last three weeks. Recently acquired **Milford Brown** and second-year pro **Uche Nwaneri** were inserted into the lineup at the guard positions to replace injured veterans Vince Manuwai and Maurice Williams. Both Manuwai (knee) and Williams (biceps) suffered season-ending injuries in the season-opener at Tennessee and were placed on injured reserve. Brown has started 46 of 51 games in seven seasons and has spent time with Houston, Arizona, St. Louis and Carolina. Veteran **Tutan Reyes** has played in 42 games with 34 starts over eight-plus NFL seasons. Center **Brad Meester** suffered a biceps injury in training camp and should return around the team's bye week in week seven. The Jaguars have a solid replacement in eight-year veteran **Dennis Norman**. Norman has started at least one game for the Jaguars the last three seasons. **Tony Pashos** anchors the right tackle spot where he started 15 games in his first season in Jacksonville after signing as an unrestricted free agent from Baltimore in 2007. **Khalif Barnes** has started 45 games at left tackle since being drafted in the second round of the 2005 draft. The club signed offensive tackle **Charles Spencer** on Sept. 4 and placed Richard Collier on the reserve/non-football injury list. The Jaguars also signed veteran **Todd Wade** to provide depth. Wade has started 96 of 100 games with Miami (2000-03), Houston (2004-05) and Washington (2006-08).

**DEFENSIVE LINE (9)** — Ted Monachino was promoted to defensive line coach after spending the last two seasons as assistant defensive line coach. The defensive line is anchored by seventh-year pro and two-time Pro Bowl selection **John Henderson**. Henderson is regarded as one of the best tackles in the NFL and has registered 24 career sacks in 99 games. **Rob Meier** has the ability to play every position on the line and he starts at tackle alongside Henderson. Meier ranks third in franchise history with 127 games played and has 20.5 career sacks. Defensive end **Paul Spicer** has produced 18 sacks the last three-plus seasons, including a team-leading 7.5 sacks along with 41 quarterback pressures in 2007. **Reggie Hayward** has 35 career sacks and is looking to return to form after missing 19 games with injuries the last two seasons. He recorded a team-leading 8.5 sacks in his first season with the Jaguars in 2005. The Jaguars added speed off the edge in this year's draft with first-round pick **Derrick Harvey** and second-round pick **Quentin Groves**. Harvey, the eighth overall pick, had 20.5 sacks in three seasons at Florida and recorded his first career interception at Tennessee in the season-opener. Groves recorded 26 sacks in four seasons at Auburn and recorded a sack/forced fumble against Buffalo on 9/14. **Derek Landri**, who played in 13 games as a rookie at tackle, sees action in the defensive tackle rotation. Landri recorded a sack, interception and fumble recovery in the postseason win at Pittsburgh last season. DT **Tony McDaniel** impressed the coaching staff in the preseason after missing 12 games in 2007 with a broken wrist. The Jaguars added former first-round pick **Jimmy Kennedy** in free agency. Kennedy has played in 58 career games with 30 starts at tackle.

**LINEBACKERS (6)** — **Mike Peterson** returns from back-to-back season-ending injuries to man the middle. Peterson suffered a torn pectoral muscle in 2006 and missed the final six games in 2007 with a broken hand. He leads the team with 41 tackles after four games. Fifth-year pro **Daryl Smith** starts on the outside after recording 100-plus tackles for the third consecutive season. Smith has moved from the outside to the middle to replace Peterson the last two years. **Justin Durant** excelled as a rookie, leading the team with 31 postseason tackles in two games and he shares the other outside spot with third-year pro **Clint Ingram**. Ingram has started 25 games since being selected in the third round of the 2006 draft. Third-year pro **Brian Iwuh** excels on special teams and adds depth in the middle. The Jaguars selected USC linebacker **Thomas Williams** in the fifth round of this year's draft and he sees extensive time on special teams.

**DEFENSIVE BACKS (10)** — The Jaguars secondary has a different look in 2008 with the addition of defensive backs coach Donnie Henderson and free agent **Drayton Florence**. Florence, an Ocala native, is starting at RCB after signing with the Jaguars as an unrestricted free agent from San Diego. Florence has played in 78 games with 47 starts and recorded 10 career interceptions. Sixth-year pro **Rashean Mathis** is regarded as one of the NFL's top cornerbacks as he was named a starter for his first Pro Bowl in 2006. Mathis holds the franchise record with 22 career interceptions including an interception at Indianapolis on 9/21 that he returned 61 yards for a touchdown. **Brian Williams** moved from cornerback to strong safety. Williams, who has started 81 games in six-plus seasons, has registered 17 career interceptions including an interception in a team-record three consecutive games in 2007. 2007 first-round pick **Reggie Nelson** has emerged as one of the NFL's top young safeties, setting a team rookie record with five interceptions as he started 15 of 16 games. **Gerald Sensabaugh** returns from a season-ending shoulder injury in 2007 that forced him to miss the final 14 regular season games and both postseason games. Sensabaugh has made 12 starts at strong safety in three-plus seasons including last week against Houston. Depth at safety is provided by veteran **Pierson Prioleau**. Prioleau is in his 10th NFL season and has played in 117 games with 47 starts. The club added **Brian Witherspoon** as a rookie free agent and he also sees time as a returner. Eighth-year veteran **William James** was signed as a backup cornerback along with **Omare Lowe**.

**KICKERS/SPECIALISTS (3)** — Joe DeCamillis is in his second season as the Jaguars special teams coordinator. **Josh Scobee**, a fifth-round pick by the Jaguars in 2004, returns for his fifth season as the placekicker. Scobee has connected on 10 of 11 field goals in four games and leads the team with 37 points. Scobee has hit game-winning field goals in consecutive weeks as he connected from 37 yards last week against Houston in overtime and 51 yards at Indianapolis on 9/21. He missed eight games in 2007 after suffering a quad injury in the pregame warmups prior to the season-opener against Tennessee. **Adam Podlesh** is in his second season as the Jaguars punter after being drafted in the fourth round of the 2007 draft, the first punter taken overall and highest-drafted punter in Jaguars history. **Joe Zelenka** handles the long snapping duties for the seventh consecutive season.

## MONTELL OWENS DOESN'T TAKE ROLE FOR GRANTED

Montell Owens entered training camp as an undrafted rookie in 2006 from Maine way down the depth chart behind a long list of running backs. Owens impressed the coaching staff with his determination and work ethic and earned on a spot on the opening day roster. Owens has emerged as the club's top special teams player the last two seasons, totaling 30 tackles in 33 games. Owens made a key play last week at Houston, taking a direct snap from center on fourth down in the first quarter and raced 41 yards to the end zone for his first career touchdown on his first career rush.

"Montell Owens continues to be a force for us covering kicks, blocking, doing all the little things and then he made a great play on fourth down where we went for the fake and made it work and he really did a nice job of running the football there," Jaguars head coach Jack Del Rio said.

## A LOOK BACK AT 2007

The Jaguars finished the regular season with a 11-5 record, tied for the fifth-best record in the NFL, and won six of their last eight games. The club advanced to the postseason for the second time in the last three seasons and won their first postseason game since the 1999 season with a 31-29 victory at Pittsburgh in the AFC Wild Card Game. Here are additional highlights from the 2007 season:

### TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

- The Jaguars ranked seventh in total offense (2nd rushing, 17th passing), tied for the second-highest ranking in team history.
- The offense set the franchise single-season record for points (411, 25.7 avg.), touchdowns (50), touchdown passes (28) and yards per play (5.6).
- The Jaguars had the fewest penalties in franchise history with 76.
- Became the first team in NFL history to win at Pittsburgh twice in the same season. The Jaguars won 29-22 during the regular season on December 16 and then claimed a 31-29 win in the AFC Wild Card Game at Heinz Field.
- The Jaguars defense ranked 12th in the NFL (313.8 avg.) and 10th in scoring defense at 19.0 points per game. The unit held opponents to 17 points or less in 10 of 16 games, tied for the most in the NFL (New England, Green Bay, San Diego). The defense allowed fewer than 100 rushing yards in nine of 16 games.
- Scored 24 or more points in 10 consecutive games for the first time in team history and scored at least three touchdowns in a team-record 10 consecutive games.
- Led the NFL with six plays of 50-plus yards.
- Set a franchise-record in the postseason with seven sacks at Pittsburgh and tied a record with three interceptions against the Steelers.

### INDIVIDUAL HIGHLIGHTS

- RB Fred Taylor played in the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career. Taylor rushed for 100-plus yards in five consecutive games to close out the regular season and was the only NFL player in 2007 to have 100-plus rushing yards in five straight games. Taylor was named to the AP All-Pro second-team and was named FedEx Ground Player of the Year.
- The running back duo of Fred Taylor (223-1,202, 5 TDs) and Maurice Jones-Drew (167-768, 9 TDs) ranked second in the NFL for the second consecutive season as they finished with 1,970 yards. Taylor led the Jaguars in rushing for the eighth time in 10 seasons.
- QB David Garrard recorded a 9-3 mark as a starter and set the franchise single-season record for highest passer rating (102.2) and highest completion percentage (64.0). Garrard led the NFL in third down passing (128.8) and attempted 230 passes without an interception to start the season over a span of eight games, both team records.
- DE Paul Spicer tied his career-high with a team-high 7.5 sacks and led the team with 41 quarterback pressures.
- Safety Reggie Nelson recorded a team-high five interceptions, the most by a rookie in team history and tied for the most by a NFL rookie in 2007.
- Reggie Williams set the franchise single-season record with 10 touchdown receptions, surpassing the previous high of eight set by Jimmy Smith in three different seasons (1998, 2000, 2001).
- Chad Nkang set the franchise record for special teams tackles with 30.

**CAREER MARKS:** Fred Taylor (1st round, 1998 draft) is the only player who has been with the club more than nine seasons in Jacksonville. Taylor holds a prominent place in the Jaguars career record books as he holds every career rushing mark and surpassed Jimmy Smith (12,285) for the most yards from scrimmage and most all-purpose yards in 2007.
