THE COACHES

MIKE TOMLIN was named the 16th head coach in Pittsburgh Steelers history on Jan. 22, 2007. Hired at the age of 34, Tomlin became only the third head coach hired by the Steelers since 1969.

Tomlin became the youngest head coach in NFL history to both coach in and win a Super Bowl when he led the Steelers to a 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in Super Bowl XLIII. By winning the Super Bowl in only his second season as a head coach, he also became the fastest to win a Super Bowl title in Steelers history.

Tomlin is one of only seven coaches in league history to win a Super Bowl within his first two seasons as an NFL head coach.

Tomlin finished his second season with a 12-4 regular-season record and his second consecutive AFC North Division title, becoming the only Steelers head coach to win division crowns in each of his first two seasons. He also set a record with 22 regular-season wins in his first two years at the helm and is the only Steelers head coach to win at least 10 games in each of his first two seasons. Tomlin's .688 winning percentage (22-10) after two years is the best in Steelers history.

The Steelers' defense was dominant under Tomlin's guidance in 2008, leading the NFL in total defense (237.2), pass defense (156.9), points per game (13.9), total yards per play (3.9), rushing yards per attempt (3.3), passing yards per attempt (4.7) and third down efficiency (31.4), and finished second in league rushing defense (80.3).

Tomlin led the Steelers to a 10-6 record in 2007, and became just the second coach in team history to post a winning record, win a division title and earn a playoff berth in his inaugural season.

Tomlin guided the Steelers to the NFL's top-ranked defense in 2007, yielding only 266.4 yards per game. The Steelers' defense ranked third in the NFL against both the run (89.9 avg.) and pass (176.5 avg.), and also finished third in the league in total yards allowed per play (4.6). Pittsburgh's defense led the NFL in passing yards per play (5.7) and first downs allowed per game (15.6), and finished second in the league in points allowed per game (16.8).

Tomlin was the NFL's second-youngest head coach in 2007, and he became only the second Steelers coach in team history to win at least 10 games during his first year at the helm. The Steelers posted a 7-1 record at home in 2007 and were 5-1 in the AFC North (3-0 at home).

Tomlin became only the second Steelers head coach to win his first three games. During 2007, the Steelers became just the fifth team in NFL history to win their first four home games by at least 20 points.

Tomlin was a three-year starter at wide receiver at William and Mary (1990-94) and finished his career with 101 receptions for 2,046 yards and a school-record 20 TD catches. A first-team All-Yankee Conference selection in 1994, he established a school record with a 20.2 yards-per-catch average.

JOSH MCDANIELS was named the 12th head coach in Denver Broncos history on Jan. 12, 2009. The 33-year-old joined the Broncos after spending the previous eight seasons (2001-08) with the New England Patriots, including the last three years (2006-08) as the club's offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach.

McDaniels was part of a New England franchise that won three Super Bowls, four AFC championships and six division titles while posting the NFL's best overall record (111-34/.766) during his eight years with the club.

STEELERS' LAST GAME

Pittsburgh 27, Minnesota 17

Sunday, Oct. 25 • Pittsburgh, Pa. (Heinz Field)

Pittsburgh Team Notes:

- The Steelers improved to 7-8 all-time against the Minnesota Vikings in the regular season, including a 5-4 mark in Pittsburgh.
- Pittsburgh improved to a perfect 4-0 on the year at Heinz Field and stretched its home winning streak to eight games at home.
- The Steelers have won four straight games, which is the longest streak for the team since they won five straight games Weeks 11-15 of last year.
- The Steelers have now won seven straight home games against teams in the NFC North, dating back to 1995.
- Pittsburgh improved to 88-55-1 all-time in the regular season against teams from the NFC.
- The Steelers have won 16 of their past 21 regular-season games versus teams in the NFC, dating back to 2003.
- Pittsburgh improved to a perfect 4-0 when facing a 6-0 team in their history, having previously defeated New England (34-20 in 2004), San Francisco (20-17 in 1984) and Cincinnati (30-24 in 1975).
- Pittsburgh improved to a perfect 4-0 in the month of October this year and upped its all-time record to 30-12 (.714) in the month of October (since the NFL merger in 1970). The Steelers have won eight of the past 10 games in the month of October, dating back to 2007.
- The attendance of 65,597 is a Heinz Field record, surpassing the old mark of 65,350 set January 18, 2009 during last season's AFC Championship Game against the Baltimore Ravens. The previous regular-season record was 65,110, which was set on September 10, 2009 against Tennessee.
- Pittsburgh jumped out to a 3-0 lead with four seconds left in the first quarter as **K Jeff Reed** booted a 39-yard field goal. The Steelers had a touchdown called back on the drive because of an offensive pass interference penalty.
- Minnesota responded with a 13-play drive that ended with a two-yard run by RB Adrian Peterson with 5:12 remaining in the first half to give it a 7-3 advantage.
- Pittsburgh took a 10-7 lead just before the half as rookie **WR Mike Wallace** hauled in a 40-yard touchdown pass from QB Ben Roethlisberger. It was Wallace's second touchdown of the season.
- Reed had a 27-yard field goal on the Steelers' first drive of the second half to give the Steelers a 13-7 lead with 11:05 remaining in the third quarter.
- Minnesota came back to cut the lead to 13-10 as K Ryan Longwell kicked an 18-yard field goal with 4:44 remaining in the third quarter. The Steelers held the Vikings to just three points after Minnesota had it first-and-goal.

- The Vikings appeared ready to either tie the game or take the lead midway through the fourth quarter, but **LB LaMarr Woodley** scooped up a QB Brett Favre fumble, which was forced on a sack by **DE Brett Keisel**, and returned it 77 yards for a touchdown with 6:23 remaining in the game. It marked the first fumble return for a touchdown by the Steelers since Woodley had a seven-yard fumble return for a score against the Baltimore Ravens on Sept. 29, 2008.
- WR Percy Harvin took the ensuing kickoff and returned it 88 yards for a touchdown to trim the lead to 20-17.
- After a punt by the Steelers, Minnesota regained possession and drove to the Pittsburgh 19-yard line, but **LB Keyaron Fox** took a tipped pass, intercepted it and returned it 82 yards for the game-clinching touchdown with only one minute remaining in the contest to seal the victory, 27-17. It was the Steelers' first interception return of the year and the first since **S Tyrone Carter** intercepted a pass and returned it 32 yards for a score in the 2008 season finale against the Cleveland Browns.
- The Steelers had two defensive touchdowns in the same game since CB Dewayne Washington had two interception returns for touchdowns against the Jacksonville Jaguars on Nov. 22, 1998.
- Pittsburgh was outgained in the game 386-259 in total offense, including 297-153 through the air.
- The Steelers tallied 14 first downs and allowed Minnesota to gain 21 first downs.
- Pittsburgh converted just 33 percent (4 of 12) of their third-down attempts. The Vikings converted 50 percent (9 of 18).
- The Vikings were flagged 11 times for 78 yards while the Steelers were penalized only three times for 15 yards.
- Pittsburgh held the ball for 23:02 to the Vikings' 36:58.
- Each team lost a fumble and Minnesota tossed one interception.
- Pittsburgh finished with four sacks, including two by **LB James Harrison** and one each by **LB James Farrior** and Keisel.
- **QB Dennis Dixon (3rd QB)**, **CB Keenan Lewis**, **FB Carey Davis**, **LB Andre Frazier**, **OG Kraig Urbik**, **OT Tony Hills**, and **DE Sunny Harris** were inactive for the Steelers.

- Finished 14-of-26 for 175 yards with one touchdown and no interceptions (87.8 passer rating).
- Tossed a 40-yard touchdown pass to WR Mike Wallace in the second quarter.
- Improved to 56-22 as a starter.
- Improved to 32-8 all-time in the regular season at Heinz Field.
- Improved to 16-5 all-time as a starter in the month of October.

RB Rashard Mendenhall

- Made his fourth straight start (fifth career).
- Finished with a team-high 69 yards on 10 carries (6.9 avg.), including a long of 17 yards.

WR Hines Ward

- Has now caught a pass in a team-record 169 consecutive games.
- Finished with one catch for three yards.

WR Santonio Holmes

- Finished with two catches for 59 yards (29.5 avg.).

Pittsburgh owns a 6-13-1 all-time record against the Denver Broncos in the regular season, including a 4-6 record in Pittsburgh and a 2-7-1 mark in Denver...the teams are tied 3-3 in postseason contests...the Broncos won the most recent meeting between the two teams, 31-28, in a Sunday Night matchup on Oct. 21, 2008...Broncos K Jason Elam hit a 49-yard field goal as time expired in that game to break a 28-28 deadlock that became possible when **QB Ben Roethlisberger** tossed two second half touchdowns to erase a 21-7 Denver lead at the half...in two career outings at Denver, Roethlisberger has completed 45-of-64 passes for 565 yards with four touchdowns and two interceptions...Roethlisberger tossed for a career-high 433 yards against the Broncos in a 31-20 loss to Denver at Heinz Field on Nov. 5, 2006...the Steelers 34-17 victory over Denver in the 2005 AFC Championship Game was Pittsburgh's first victory in the Mile High City since a 34-17 victory on Oct. 14, 1990 - Pittsburgh's most recent regular-season victory in Denver, and the only regular-season victory for Pittsburgh in Denver since a 21-17 victory on Dec. 16, 1978.

TEAM NOTES

Monday Night Madness: Pittsburgh owns a 37-22 all-time record on Monday night games. The Steelers have won four straight games on Monday Night Football.

The Steelers' 37 wins rank second in the AFC behind Miami (40) and fourth in the NFL (Dallas - 41, San Francisco - 38). Pittsburgh's 37 wins are more than the other three AFC North teams combined (28; Cleveland 15, Cincinnati 9, Baltimore 4).

This marks the third meeting between the Steelers and Broncos on Monday Night Football but the first since Sept. 15, 1986. Denver won that matchup, 21-10, in Pittsburgh. The only other game between the teams on Monday night was a 42-7 Steelers' victory on Oct. 22, 1979 at Three Rivers Stadium.

The Steelers are 14-17 all-time on the road on Monday night and are looking for their second straight road win in such games. Last year, Pittsburgh defeated the Washington Redskins, 23-6, at FedEx Field.

In The Spotlight: The Steelers are 11-1 in primetime regular-season games under third-year head coach **Mike Tomlin**. Tomlin is 4-0 all-time on Monday Night Football.

The Steelers have won 11 straight games in primetime under Tomlin. Pittsburgh is 2-0 this year in primetime games and is scheduled to play a total of five primetime games this season (Week 4 vs. San Diego, Week 9 at Denver, Week 12 at Baltimore and Week 14 at Cleveland).

Doomed In Denver: The Steelers are looking to snap a four-game regular-season losing streak in Denver as they battle the Broncos in Week 9.

Pittsburgh is 2-7-1 all-time on the road against the Denver Broncos and has not won in the regular season there since a 34-17 victory on Oct. 14, 1990.

The Steelers did, however, defeat the Broncos in the 2005 AFC Championship Game at INVESCO Field at Mile High.

Post-Bye Week Success: The Steelers have won five of their last seven games following a bye week.

Over the last 10 years, Pittsburgh is 6-4 in games following a bye week and is 11-8 all-time following a bye (the Steelers had two bye weeks during the 1993 season).

Steelers-Broncos Connections: Several Steelers have ties to the Broncos and the Denver area.

Steelers with connections to the Broncos include tight ends coach **James Daniel**, who got his first NFL experience through the NFL's Fellowship Program with Denver in 1992.

Steelers with connections to Colorado include **DE Travis Kirschke**, who is from Highland, Colo.

Broncos with ties to Pittsburgh and the Steelers include **DL Ryan McBean**, who was drafted by the Steelers in the fourth round (132nd overall) in the 2007 NFL Draft. He spent time on the team's active roster and practice squad before being released in the 2008 training camp. **P Mitch Berger** punted for the Steelers in 2008.

Facing The Best: The Steelers defeated the previously undefeated (6-0) Minnesota Vikings in Week 7 at Heinz Field and improved to 4-0 all-time against 6-0 teams.

The Steelers previously defeated New England (34-20 victory in 2004), San Francisco (20-17 victory in 1984) and Cincinnati (30-24 victory in 1975).

Pittsburgh became the first team in NFL history to defeat two undefeated teams with at least six wins in consecutive weeks when they beat the Patriots (34-20) and Philadelphia Eagles (27-3) in 2004 in Weeks 8-9.

Road Warriors: Pittsburgh has won seven of its last nine road games and finished the 2008 season with a 6-2 mark away from home.

Pittsburgh continues to have great success playing away from Heinz Field. Since the beginning of the 1999 season, the Steelers own the third-best road winning percentage in the NFL.

Conference Control: The Steelers have won 12 of their past 15 games against AFC opponents. Pittsburgh is 2-1 this year against AFC teams.

The Steelers finished last season with a 12-4 mark, including an impressive 10-2 record against AFC opponents.

Pittsburgh's 10-2 record within the conference tied for the best mark in the NFL with Indianapolis. The last time Pittsburgh finished with a better record against AFC opponents was in 2004 when it finished 11-1.

Returning To Form: The Steelers have won four straight games and used two returns to seal their most-recent victory.

In its Week 7 victory over Minnesota, Pittsburgh used a fumble return and interception return for touchdowns to help knock off the previously unbeaten Vikings. It marked the first time the Steelers had two returns for touchdowns in the same game since Nov. 22, 1998, against the Jacksonville Jaguars.

LB LaMarr Woodley scooped up a fumble and returned it 77 yards for a touchdown midway through the fourth quarter. With one minute left in the game, backup **LB Keyaron Fox** picked off a QB Brett Favre pass and returned it 82 yards for a touchdown, which was the third-longest (tied) return for a touchdown in the regular season in team history.

Turning Up the Heat: Pittsburgh posted a season-high seven sacks in the Week 5 victory at the Detroit Lions, led by **LB James Harrison's** three. The seven sacks were the most by the Steelers

DEFENDING THE RUN...

In the Steelers' Week 4 victory over the San Diego Chargers, Pittsburgh allowed just 16 yards rushing on eight attempts (2.0 avg.). It marked the lowest rushing total against the Steelers since New England managed only five yards rushing in a 34-20 Pittsburgh victory at Heinz Field on Oct. 31, 2004.

since they tallied seven against the Washington Redskins on Nov. 3, 2008.

On the year, the Steelers have 21 sacks, which ranks second in the AFC and fourth in the NFL, after finishing first in the AFC and second in the NFL with 51 sacks in 2008. The 51 sacks were the most since the Steelers had a team-record-tying 55 sacks in 2001.

Since 1994, the Steelers have led the AFC in sacks four times and the entire NFL twice.

Sacks became an official NFL statistic in 1982, however, a record of "passers tackled" was kept prior to that time. Following are the Steelers' single-season sack totals dating back to 1970:

Octoberfest: The Steelers were 4-0 this year in the month of October after their 27-17 victory over the Minnesota Vikings in Week 7.

Pittsburgh is 8-2 in the month of October, dating back to 2007. Since 1999, the Steelers are 30-12 (.714) in October.

Offensive Explosion: The Steelers' offense, which ranks third in the AFC and sixth in the NFL by averaging 383.0 yards per game, had a memorable day in the Week 6 victory over the Cleveland Browns at Heinz Field.

The Steelers finished with a season-high 543 yards of total offense (403 passing, 140 rushing) in Week 6 versus Cleveland, which was the most by the team since they posted 556 yards of offense in a 49-31 victory over the Cincinnati Bengals on Nov. 19, 1995.

For just the second time in team history, Pittsburgh had a 400-yard passer (**QB Ben Roethlisberger** - 417 yards) and two 100-yard receivers (**WR Hines Ward** - 159 yards, **WR Santonio Holmes** - 104 yards).

Roethlisberger's 417 yards were the third-highest total in team history and the second-highest for his career. Ward's 159 yards were the third-highest in his career and the most since he had a personal-best 171 on Oct. 22, 2006, at Atlanta.

Heinz Field Advantage: The Steelers own the best home record in the NFL with a 220-83-1 record (.725) since 1970. Pittsburgh is 35-9 (.795) at home over the past five-plus seasons, including a 4-0 record in 2009.

Pittsburgh finished the 2004 regular season with an undefeated (8-0) home record for only the third time in team history and for the first time in 25 years.

The Steelers finished the 1979 regular season with an undefeated home record (8-0) and eventually won Super Bowl XIV. The Steelers were also undefeated at home (7-0) in 1972.

If You Build It, They Will Come: The Steelers broke the all-time attendance mark at Heinz Field in their Week 7 victory over the Minnesota Vikings. The attendance of 65,597 surpassed the old mark of 65,350 set January 18, 2009, during last season's AFC Championship Game against the Baltimore Ravens.

Pittsburgh is averaging 64,788 fans this season in four home games at Heinz Field, which is on pace to break the single-season record for attendance.

The previous regular-season record was 65,110, which was set earlier this year in Week 1 (September 10) against the Tennessee Titans.

Pittsburgh set the team home attendance record in 2005 by averaging 63,429 (507,434 total).

Pittsburgh has sold out 285 straight games at home, dating back to Nov. 5, 1972 versus Cincinnati.

Pittsburgh's largest average attendance at Three Rivers Stadium was 58,077 in 1998. Following is a look at the team's average attendance in its seven years at Heinz Field:

Picking Your Poison: The Steelers have five interceptions on the year after picking off one pass in their Week 7 victory over the Minnesota Vikings.

LB Keyaron Fox, filling in for the **LB Lawrence Timmons** who was injured earlier in the game, picked off a QB Brett Favre pass and returned it 82 yards for a touchdown with one minute remaining to seal the victory against the Vikings.

S Troy Polamalu, who missed four weeks with a knee injury, and **S Ryan Clark** each have two interceptions on the year. The Steelers have posted at least one interception in three straight games.

Last year, the Steelers had 20 interceptions in 2008, which ranked third (tied) in the AFC and sixth (tied) in the NFL. Pittsburgh posted at least one interception in six of the final seven games of the regular season.

For the year, Polamalu had a team-best seven interceptions, which was a career high.

Divisional Dominance: Pittsburgh has won six of its last seven games against AFC North Division opponents and is 13-3 in its last 16 divisional games.

The Steelers finished the 2008 season undefeated against AFC North Division foes. It marked the first time since 2002 the Steelers had an unblemished record in divisional play (6-0).

Pittsburgh finished the 2007 season 5-1 against AFC North foes. The Steelers' lone loss within the division that year was in the regular-season finale at Baltimore when Pittsburgh rested a number of starters after already clinching the AFC North crown.

Defense! Defense! Defense! The Steelers defense has been known for shutting down their opponents and this year is no different.

The Steelers defense has been making big plays all season when the game is on the line, including "splash" plays in Week 1 versus Tennessee, Week 5 at Detroit and Week 7 versus Minnesota.

In the Week 7 victory over the previously unbeaten Vikings, the Steelers' defense had two returns for touchdowns. **LB LaMarr Woodley** posted his second career fumble return for a touchdown as he scooped up a QB Brett Favre fumble and raced 77 yards for a score.

LB Keyaron Fox also made the Vikings pay late in the game as he sealed the victory with an 82-yard interception return for a touchdown with one minute remaining, his first career interception and touchdown.

Pittsburgh had one interception (**S Troy Polamalu**) and one sack (**LB James Farrior**), and limited the Titans to just 31 percent (4 of 13) on third-down attempts in Week 1. The Steelers also limited Tennessee to just 86 yards rushing and forced one fumble.

Leading 28-20 late in the game of Week 5 versus the Lions, Pittsburgh registered three straight sacks with less than two minutes remaining to seal the victory.

In 2008, the Steelers defense gave opponents fits all season as it ranked in the top three in the NFL in several categories. The Steelers ranked first in the NFL in total defense, allowing just 237.2 yards per game. Pittsburgh had 20 interceptions in 2008 and posted an AFC-best 51 sacks. The Steelers allowed a league-low 3.9 yards per play, the lowest of any defense in the NFL since 1978.

Sustaining Success: Pittsburgh has made the playoffs five times and won the AFC North four times since the divisional realignment in 2002. The Steelers won the AFC North Division for the second consecutive year in 2008.

LOOKING AHEAD...

The Steelers return home for an AFC North battle against the Cincinnati Bengals on Sunday, Nov. 15. Kickoff at Heinz Field is set for 1 p.m. and will be televised on CBS (locally KDKA-TV, channel 2). Pittsburgh looks to avenge a Week 3 23-20 loss to the Bengals at Paul Brown Stadium.

The Steelers have won 19 division titles since the NFL merger in 1970, the most in the AFC during that time. The 2008 season also marks the fourth time they captured the AFC North Crown since 2002.

Holding Their Ground: Over the past nine years, Pittsburgh's defense has been among the best at holding its opponents to the fewest rushing yards in the league. This season, the Steelers are giving up 76.6 yards per game on the ground, which is first in the AFC and in the NFL.

The Steelers allowed just 80.3 rushing yards per game in 2008. Pittsburgh ranked first in the AFC and second in the NFL in rushing defense and the 80.3 rushing yards per game were the second-least the Steelers have allowed since the NFL merger in 1970 (74.4 in 2001).

In the past seven seasons, Pittsburgh has allowed an NFL-low eight 100-yard rushers. Baltimore is second with 14.

Additionally, since 1994 the Steelers have led the AFC in rushing defense eight times and the entire NFL three times.

Run Stuffers: The Steelers have not allowed a 100-yard rusher in the past 25 regular-season games and have allowed only three 100-yard rushers in the past 79 games. The Steelers previously had a streak of 34 straight games in which it did not allow a 100-yard rusher.

Facing the NFC North: The Steelers are 2-1 against the NFC North during the Mike Tomlin era following their 27-17 victory over the Minnesota Vikings in Week 7.

Pittsburgh has won 10 of their past 12 games (dating back to 1998) against teams currently in the NFC North. The Steelers have won seven straight home games against NFC North teams, dating back to 1995.

Controlling The NFC: The Steelers have won 16 of their past 21 regular-season games versus teams in the NFC, dating back to 2003.

The Steelers are 93-56-1 (.623) all-time against teams from the NFC, including a 52-19-1 record at home and a 35-36 mark on the road. Pittsburgh had won eight straight games versus NFC teams at home prior to its 2008 Week 8 loss to the New York Giants.

200 Plateau: Since the NFL merger in 1970, Pittsburgh is 95-6 (.941) in the regular season when it rushes for more than 200 yards in a game. The Steelers have won 24 straight games in which they have eclipsed that mark for rushing yards.

Pittsburgh is 7-0 all-time in the postseason when rushing for more than 200 yards.

In the Red Zone: The Steelers have converted 21 of their 23 attempts (13 touchdowns, eight field goals) in the red zone into points in 2009.

The Steelers had a streak of scoring 10 straight touchdowns in trips to the red zone, but it was snapped with a 32-yard field goal by **K Jeff Reed** in Week 6 versus the Cleveland Browns.

COACHING NOTES

Few And Far Between: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** became the first coach in Steelers history to win division titles in each of his first two seasons.

In 2007, the Steelers captured the AFC North in his first season.

Tomlin became just the second head coach in team history to post a winning record in his first season with a mark of 10-6.

Double-Digit Duty: Head Coach **Mike Tomlin** led the Steelers to a 12-4 record in 2008. He became the first coach in team history to win at least 10 games in each of his first two seasons after finishing his rookie season with a 10-6 record.

LeBeau's Magic: Defensive coordinator **Dick LeBeau**, a current finalist for induction into the Pro Football Hall of Fame, is in his 51st NFL season as either a player or coach. He is considered the creator of the "fire-zone" or "zone blitz" defensive scheme that is used in multiple varieties by many NFL and college teams.

LeBeau returned to the Steelers for a second stint as the team's defensive leader prior to the 2004 season. Since his return, the Steelers defense has ranked at or near the top of most major statistical categories.

High Honor Roll: Two of Pittsburgh's defensive coaches have been recognized for their outstanding football careers, both as coaches and players.

Assistant head coach/defensive line coach **John Mitchell** was inducted into the Alabama Sports Hall of Fame this past year. Mitchell graduated from the University of Alabama in 1972 after playing two years for the Crimson Tide. He became the first African-American to play for Alabama and was an All-American his senior season. Mitchell went on to coach under the legendary Paul "Bear" Bryant at Alabama.

Defensive coordinator **Dick LeBeau** was inducted into the Ohio State University Hall of Fame on Sept. 25. He played at Ohio State as a cornerback and halfback and was a member of the 1957 national championship team. LeBeau went on to an outstanding NFL career, finishing with 62 career interceptions (seventh all-time) and 171 consecutive starts (NFL record for a cornerback) with the Detroit Lions.

- **WR Hines Ward** continues to make play after play for the Steelers in his 12th year in the NFL. Ward is eighth in the NFL with 42 receptions and fifth with 603 receiving yards. Earlier this year he eclipsed 10,000 yards for his career and has three 100-yard games in the first seven weeks of the season, including a season-high 159 yards in Week 6 versus Cleveland. Ward is a team co-captain on offense for the fifth consecutive year.

- **QB Ben Roethlisberger** is among the elite quarterbacks in the league once again as he ranks in the top 5 in the NFL in passing yards (3rd - 2,062), completion pct. (2nd - 70.4), average gain/pass (1st - 8.85) and fourth-quarter completion percentage (1st - 82.9). Roethlisberger had posted three straight 100-plus passer rating games in 2009 and is on pace for a record-setting year in a number of categories.

- **TE Heath Miller** is having a Pro-Bowl caliber season as he is on pace to break his personal bests in a number of categories. Miller has a team-best four receiving touchdowns on the year and has 40 catches for 353 yards. He ranks seventh (tied) in the AFC overall in receptions, but second (tied) among all tight ends in the NFL.

- **WR Santonio Holmes** ranks ninth (tied) in the NFL in third-down receptions (12) and third in third-down receiving yards (208), and he is second on the team with 497 receiving yards on 30 catches (16.6 avg.). In the season opener against Tennessee, Holmes caught nine passes for 131 yards and one touchdown and has two 100-yard receiving games on the year.

- **LB James Harrison** has a team-high eight sacks this season, which ranks third (tied) in the NFL, after being named the NFL's Defensive Player of the Year in 2008 when he posted a club-record 16 sacks en route to his second Pro Bowl appearance. Harrison had three sacks in the Week 5 victory at Detroit and has forced a team-high four fumbles in 2009 after leading the NFL with seven forced fumbles last year.

- **CB Ike Taylor** has started 40 straight games at cornerback and is having a Pro-Bowl caliber year by shutting down the opponents top receiver week after week. Taylor has a team-best nine pass breakups and has helped the Steelers' defense allow only 214.4 yards per game through the air.

- **P Daniel Sepulveda** has given the Steelers an added boost after missing last year with a knee injury. Sepulveda is averaging 40.2 net yards per punt, which ranks fourth in the AFC, and has 10 punts downed inside the 20-yard line.

- **PR/KR Stefan Logan** is averaging 26.5 yards per kickoff return, which ranks seventh in the AFC and 12th in the NFL, in his first season with the Steelers. He also averages 7.5 yards per punt return.

INDIVIDUAL OFFENSIVE NOTES

Day To Remember: QB Ben Roethlisberger threw for 417 yards with two touchdowns and one interception for a 113.6 passer rating in the Week 6 victory over the Cleveland Browns.

Roethlisberger's 417 yards passing were the second-highest total (433, Nov. 5, 2006) in his career and the third-highest total (473 by Tommy Maddox, Nov. 10, 2002 in an overtime game) in team history.

Roethlisberger tied Hall of Famer Terry Bradshaw with his 31st career 100-plus passer rating for the most in team history in the regular season.

Additionally, Roethlisberger improved to a perfect 10-0 against the Cleveland Browns. He is just the second player since 1970 to win his first 10 regular-season games against an opponent, joining Hall of Famer John Elway (versus New England).

Controlling The North: QB Ben Roethlisberger owns a 23-5 (.821) record as a starter against AFC North opponents during his career with the Steelers. That marks the best record in division games among QBs who began their career since 1970 (minimum 20 starts against division opponents).

Roethlisberger had won 12 straight games against divisional foes as the starter prior to the Week 3 setback at Cincinnati, which was the longest streak in the NFL and the longest since Peyton Manning won 12 straight from 2004-06.

In his 28 career games versus division opponents, Roethlisberger posted a perfect passer rating once (11/5/07 vs. Baltimore) and has recorded a passer rating of over 100.0 a total of 12 times.

Home Cooking: QB Ben Roethlisberger owns a 32-8 (.800) mark in the regular season in his career at Heinz Field, including winning his first eight starts.

At Heinz Field, Roethlisberger is 690-of-1,083 (63.7%) for 8,843 yards with 55 touchdowns and 37 interceptions for a passer rating of 91.9. He has thrown for more than 300 yards six times and has 17 multi-touchdown games at home (14-3 record in such games).

Roethlisberger has twice posted a perfect passer rating at home, including most recently in Week 9 of 2007 against Baltimore. He also had a perfect passer rating (158.3) against Tennessee in the 2005 season opener and has posted at least a 125.0 passer rating seven times.

The Steelers have scored at least 20 points in 33 of the 40 games at home with Roethlisberger as the starter.

Rising To The Occasion: QB Ben Roethlisberger is off to another great season in leading Pittsburgh to a 4-2 start in 2009.

Roethlisberger leads the NFL average gain/pass (8.85) and fourth-quarter completion percentage (82.9).

Roethlisberger has completed 70.4 percent of his passes, which is second in the NFL, and has a passer rating of 102.6, which is second in the AFC and sixth in the NFL. He ranks in the top five in the NFL in other categories, including passing yards (3rd - 2,062) and passing yards/single game (2nd - 417).

Roethlisberger has thrown to many different targets this year and the Steelers have two of the top 10 receivers in the NFL in

receptions, including **WR Hines Ward** (8th - 42) and **TE Heath Miller** (T-9th - 40).

Starting In Style: In his first five seasons, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** owns a 56-22 (.718) record as a starting quarterback in the regular season. That mark is the second-best in the NFL among all active quarterbacks.

Facing The NFC: With a career record of 56-22 as a starter, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** has posted gaudy numbers no matter the opposition.

During his first five-plus seasons, Roethlisberger has feasted upon competition from the NFC. In 22 career regular-season games against NFC opponents, Roethlisberger has posted a 17-5 record while completing 316-of-523 passes (60.4 pct.) for 4,223 yards with 29 touchdowns and 16 interceptions for a passer rating of 91.8.

Roethlisberger's statistics against the NFC are more impressive in games at Heinz Field. In 11 career games against NFC opponents at home, Roethlisberger has a 10-1 mark while completing 144-of-257 passes (56.0 pct.) for 2,018 yards with 13 touchdowns and eight interceptions for a passer rating of 85.4.

Roethlisberger won his first seven starts when facing teams in the NFC.

Thursday Night Thriller: **QB Ben Roethlisberger** improved to 4-0 on Thursday night games following the Steelers' Week 1 victory over the Tennessee Titans.

In that game, Roethlisberger finished 33-for-43 for 363 yards with one touchdown and two interceptions (89.6 passer rating). His 363 yards passing were the most by a Steeler in a season opener since 1970.

Title Man: **QB Ben Roethlisberger** led the Steelers to the AFC Championship Game three times in his first five seasons.

Roethlisberger joined Roger Staubach, Bernie Kosar, Tom Brady and Donovan McNabb as the only quarterbacks to lead their teams to the conference title game at least three times in their first five seasons as the starting quarterback.

Gradual Improvement: With two Super Bowl championships in his first five seasons, **QB Ben Roethlisberger** has proven his status among the elite quarterbacks of the NFL.

Roethlisberger has positioned himself for such success by improving his team's winning percentage each month over the course of his first five-plus seasons. During that time, Roethlisberger has seen his winning percentage improve from September to December.

Comeback Kid: **QB Ben Roethlisberger** posted his first fourth quarter/overtime game-winning drive of the season when he led the Steelers to a 13-10 overtime win against the Tennessee Titans in Week 1.

On the final drive in overtime against the Titans, Roethlisberger was 5-for-7 for 60 yards that led to a K Jeff Reed game-winning 33-yard field goal. It marked his 18th career such victory in his sixth season as the starting quarterback for Pittsburgh, which is the most in the NFL since 2004.

In 2008, Roethlisberger had five fourth-quarter, game-winning drives in the regular season.

A listing of all of Roethlisberger's fourth quarter and overtime game-winning drives entering this season are available on page 239 of the Steelers media guide.

Passing Perfection: QB Ben Roethlisberger, who earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2007, has achieved a number of outstanding single-season accomplishments in his five-year career, including achieving a feat three times that is rarely done in the NFL.

Roethlisberger, who set the team's single-season mark for passer rating (104.1) in 2007, has had a perfect passer rating (158.3) three times in his career, tying him with QB Peyton Manning for the most in NFL history (minimum 10 attempts).

Roethlisberger's 31 career 100-plus passer rating games in the regular season rank second in team history behind Terry Bradshaw, who had 31 such games since the passer rating rule was implemented in 1973.

300-Yard Plateau: **QB Ben Roethlisberger** has thrown for over 300 yards three times this season, giving him 10 for his career. The 10 career 300-yard passing games are a team record.

Roethlisberger threw for over 300 yards three times in 2009, including Tennessee (363) in Week 1, San Diego (333) in Week 4 and Cleveland (417) in Week 6.

Super Bowl MVPs: The Steelers are the first team in NFL history to have two Super Bowl MVP wide receivers on the same team at the same time.

WR Hines Ward won Super Bowl XL MVP honors after finishing with five receptions for 123 yards with one touchdown in the 21-10 victory over the Seattle Seahawks.

WR Antonio Holmes won Super Bowl XLIII MVP honors after catching the game-winning touchdown pass with 35 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to seal the 27-23 victory over the Arizona Cardinals. Holmes finished with nine catches for 131 yards and one touchdown.

Ward Still Has It: **WR Hines Ward**, in his 12th year in the league, is proving he is still one of the elite wide receivers in the game by ranking eighth in the NFL in receptions (42) and fifth in receiving yards (602), and he showed it once again in Week 6 versus the Cleveland Browns.

Ward finished with a season-high 159 yards receiving on eight catches (19.9 avg.) with one touchdown against the Browns. The 159 yards receiving were the third-highest total in his career and

the most since he had a personal-best 171 yards on Oct. 22, 2006, at Atlanta.

Ward's 159 yards marked his 23rd career 100-yard receiving game and the third in 2009. His 52-yard touchdown was his club-record 74th career and was the longest TD catch for him since he hauled in an 85-yarder against New England on Sept. 25, 2005.

10,000 And Counting: WR Hines Ward finished with 82 yards receiving in Week 3 at Cincinnati and became the first receiver in team history to reach 10,000 career receiving yards. Ward currently has 10,382 receiving yards for his career.

Ward became just the fifth player in NFL history to reach 10,000 receiving yards with one team. Additionally, Ward, who has 841 career receptions, became just the 21st player in NFL history to record 800 receptions and 10,000 yards in a career.

Top Dawg: WR Hines Ward is the only wide receiver in Steelers history to be voted to four Pro Bowls. Ward's 1,043 receiving yards in 2008 made him the first Steelers receiver to reach 1,000 yards five times during his career with the team. No other Steeler has more than three.

In 2002, Ward became the first receiver in Steelers history to catch 100 passes (112) in a season. He also became the first Steelers receiver with three consecutive games with at least 100 yards receiving. His 12 touchdown receptions in 2002 tied him with Louis Lipps (1985) and Buddy Dial (1961) for the highest single-season total in team history.

Ward was selected to the 2002-05 AFC Pro Bowl squads.

Ward On The Run: WR Hines Ward's versatility makes him a threat to run the football as well as catch a pass.

Ward has 430 career rushing yards to mark the most by a Steelers wide receiver in team history.

Ward scored his first career rushing touchdown in 2004 against Philadelphia.

Holmes Heating Up: WR Santonio Holmes has become a major threat in the Steelers offense after posting a breakout season in 2008.

Holmes is third on the team with 30 receptions and is second with 497 receiving yards and one touchdown.

Holmes ranks ninth (tied) in the NFL in third-down receptions with 12 and third in third-down receiving yards (208).

In the Steelers' Week 1 victory over the Titans earlier this year, Holmes had nine catches for 131 yards with one touchdown, his identical numbers when he won Super Bowl XLIII MVP honors last February.

Holmes finished the 2008 regular season with a career-high 55 catches for 821 yards (14.9 avg.) with five touchdowns. He was also named MVP of Super Bowl XLIII after finishing with nine catches for 131 yards with one touchdown, the game-winner with 35 seconds left in the fourth quarter.

Wallace Steps Up: Rookie WR Mike Wallace has 21 catches for 368 yards (17.5 avg.) with two touchdowns on the year. His 17.5 yards per catch average leads the team.

Wallace ranks third among all NFL rookies with 368 receiving yards and 21 receptions.

Wallace finished with three catches for 72 yards (24.0 avg.) with one touchdown in the Steelers' Week 7 victory over the Minnesota Vikings. He hauled in a 40-yard touchdown pass from QB Ben Roethlisberger late in the first half to give the Steelers the lead for good.

Wallace had a career day in Week 3 at Cincinnati. He finished with a career-high 102 yards receiving with seven receptions (14.6 avg.) against the Bengals. Wallace hauled in a personal-best 51-yard pass.

Wallace is the first Steelers' rookie to post over 100 yards receiving since Santonio Holmes had 134 on Dec. 31, 2006, also at Cincinnati.

Wallace posted his first career touchdown when he hauled in a 47-yard strike from Roethlisberger in Week 5 at Detroit.

Mendenhall Makes The Most Of It: RB Rashard Mendenhall has started the past four games and has made the most of his opportunity...and more. Mendenhall leads the team with 418 yards rushing on 78 carries (5.4 avg.) with a team-high four touchdowns.

In his four games as the starter this year, Mendenhall has 373 yards rushing on 71 carries (5.3 avg.) with four touchdowns.

Mendenhall finished with a career-high 165 yards rushing on 29 carries (5.7 avg.) with two touchdowns (first two of his career) in Week 4 versus the San Diego Chargers. He also caught two passes for 26 yards (13.0 avg.).

Mendenhall's 165 rushing yards were the most by a Steeler since Parker had a club-record 223 yards rushing on Dec. 7, 2006. It marked the Steelers' first 100-yard rushing game of the season and the first since the 2008 season finale against Cleveland (Parker - 116).

Mendenhall's performance was just the sixth time a Steeler rushed for at least 165 yards and two touchdowns in the same game since the NFL merger in 1970. The following is a look at the six times a Steeler has accomplished the feat:

Gimme The Rock: RB Willie Parker is second on the team with 187 yards rushing on 60 carries (3.1 avg.) in 2009 after missing two weeks (Weeks 4-5) with a toe injury.

Parker has 5,176 career rushing yards, which is the most by an active undrafted free agent and the third-most by an undrafted free agent in NFL history. Pro Football Hall of Famer Joe Perry (San Francisco-Baltimore) is first among undrafted players with 8,378 while Priest Holmes (Baltimore-Kansas City) is second with 8,172 career rushing yards.

Parker finished 2008 with 791 yards on 210 attempts (3.8 avg.) and rushed for over 100 yards four times.

In the regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns, Parker had 116 yards rushing on 23 attempts (5.0 avg.) and scored his fifth rushing touchdown of the season. His 34-yard touchdown run was the longest run from scrimmage by the Steelers in 2008.

Parker Proving His Worth: RB Willie Parker led the Steelers in rushing for the fourth consecutive season in 2008, finishing with 791 yards. He joined Jerome Bettis, Franco Harris, John Henry Johnson and Fran Rogel as the only backs in team history to lead the team in rushing in four straight seasons.

Parker rushed for over 1,000 yards for the third consecutive season as he finished the 2007 season with 1,316 yards. He became just the third running back in team history to accomplish the feat (Jerome Bettis, Franco Harris).

Parker has 25 career 100-yard rushing games and the Steelers are 22-3 in those contests.

Moore Making His Case: RB Mewelde Moore continues to play a significant role as a backup running back and a third-down back.

Moore has 14 catches for 100 yards with one receiving touchdown this year and 21 rushes for 71 yards (3.4 avg.). He also threw a touchdown pass to TE Heath Miller in the Week 4 victory versus the Chargers.

Moore did an excellent job in 2008 of filling in when Parker was injured and often split time in the backfield when Parker played.

In 2008, Moore was second on the team with 588 yards rushing on 140 carries (4.2 avg.) with five touchdowns and caught 40 passes for 320 yards (8.0 avg.) with one touchdown.

In four games replacing Parker as the starter in the backfield in 2008, Moore had 360 yards rushing on 80 carries (4.5 avg.) with five touchdowns and 16 catches for 89 yards (5.6 avg.) with one touchdown.

Moore became the first Steelers running back other than Parker or Jerome Bettis to have more than 100 yards rushing and two rushing touchdowns in a regular-season game since 1995. Bam Morris finished with 101 yards rushing and three touchdowns on Nov. 19, 1995 in a win at Cincinnati.

Miller Time: TE Heath Miller is having a standout year in 2009 and has developed into one of the Steelers' most potent offensive weapons as he leads the Steelers with four receiving touchdowns.

Miller is second on the team with 40 catches and is third with 353 yards (8.8 avg.) in 2009 and on pace for career highs in those

categories. In addition, his blocking ability separates him from many "receiving" tight ends.

Miller started the 2009 season with a career-high (tied) eight receptions for 64 yards (8.0 avg.) in Week 1 versus Tennessee.

Miller became just the fifth tight end in team history to reach 2,000 career receiving yards in Week 2 at Chicago (first since Eric Green - 1994).

Miller had scored at least one touchdown in three straight games (Weeks 4-6), tying the longest streak of his career.

In 2008, Miller had a career-best 48 catches for 514 yards (10.7 avg.) with three touchdowns despite missing two games with an ankle injury.

Miller has 25 career touchdowns, which is second on the team's all-time list for touchdowns by a tight end. Pittsburgh is 17-5 when Miller finds the end zone.

INDIVIDUAL DEFENSIVE NOTES

Harrison In Charge: LB James Harrison, the reigning NFL Defensive Player of the Year, has received extra attention from opposing blockers this season but has still managed to make an impact. Harrison leads the team and ranks third (tied) in the NFL with his eight sacks.

Harrison wreaked havoc on QB Brett Favre in the Steelers' Week 7 victory over the Vikings. Harrison finished with two sacks, including a crushing takedown of Favre on the game's final play.

Over a two-week stretch (Weeks 4-5), Harrison posted five of his team-high six sacks on the year while forcing two fumbles in that span. Harrison had a season-best three sacks in Week 5 at Detroit and was named the AFC Defensive Player of the Week for his efforts against the Lions.

Harrison has forced four fumbles this year. He led the NFL in 2008 with seven forced fumbles.

Last year, Harrison finished second in the AFC and fourth in the NFL with a career-high and team-record 16 sacks in 2008. His outstanding play in 2008 earned him his second straight start in the Pro Bowl as well as his second consecutive team MVP award.

Harrison had 100 tackles last year, which ranked third on the team and was a career high, and posted 34 pressures.

Harrison has 36.5 sacks in his career and the Steelers are 17-8 when he posts a sack.

Sack Attack: LB James Harrison has eight sacks on the year after posting two in Week 7 versus the Minnesota Vikings.

Harrison had a career-high 16 sacks in 2008, breaking the team record for sacks in a season. Mike Merriweather previously held the record since 1984.

Double Trouble: The Steelers have a tradition of fielding some of the best pass-rushing linebackers in the NFL.

In Week 5 at Detroit, LB James Harrison (3) and LB LaMarr Woodley (2) combined for five sacks in the 28-20 Steelers' victory. On the year, they have totaled 10 sacks between them (Harrison - 8, Woodley - 2).

In 2008, Harrison and Woodley broke the team's top sack duo record (since 1982) by combining for 27.5 sacks. The 27.5 sacks by Harrison (16) and Woodley (11.5) broke the record (24) previously held by Jason Gildon (13.5) and Joey Porter (10.5) in 2000 and Kevin Greene (14) and Greg Lloyd (10) in 1994.

Harrison was fourth in the NFL in sacks in 2008 while Woodley ranked ninth (tied). In 2007, Harrison finished with a team-high 8.5 sacks while earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl (starter). Woodley posted four sacks in a limited role in 2007 as a rookie.

Bringing The Wood: LB LaMarr Woodley posted his second career fumble return for a touchdown in the Steelers' Week 7 victory over the Minnesota Vikings.

Woodley scooped up a QB Brett Favre fumble and returned it 77 yards for a touchdown midway through the fourth quarter. His other fumble return for a touchdown was in 2008 against the Baltimore Ravens (Sept. 29).

Woodley posted two sacks in the Week 5 victory at Detroit, his first two sacks of the season.

Woodley has 25 tackles this year after having a breakout season in 2008.

Woodley had a career-high 11.5 sacks and 78 tackles (53 solo) in 2008, his first season as a starter. Woodley tallied at least one sack in eight of the 15 games he started and the Steelers were 7-1 when he posted a sack last year.

Woodley also added six sacks in the 2008 postseason, including two each of the three playoff games. Woodley owns an NFL record by posting two sacks in each of his four postseason games.

Woodley ranked ninth (tied) in the NFL in sacks with 11.5. He ranked first (tied) in the NFL with four fumble recoveries for a defensive player.

Fantastic Farris: LB James Farris leads the team with 59 total tackles (41 solo) and has two sacks this season.

Farris had a team-high 15 tackles and one sack (26th of his career; 21.5 with Pittsburgh) in the Week 7 victory over the Minnesota Vikings.

Farris began the 2009 season by posting his first sack of the year in the win over the Tennessee Titans. He finished with seven tackles (two solo).

Farris, who earned his second trip to the Pro Bowl in 2008, signed a new five-year deal prior to the 2008 season. He responded by leading the team in tackles with 146 in 2008, the third-highest total in his career, and also had 3.5 sacks.

For his career, Farris has 10 interceptions, including seven with Pittsburgh and three while playing for the Jets.

Timmons Time: LB Lawrence Timmons, the Steelers' No. 1 pick in the 2007 NFL Draft, entered the 2009 season as a starter for the first time in his career and has been solid throughout the season.

During a two-game stretch earlier this year, Timmons had three sacks, including a career-best two in Week 6 versus Cleveland and one versus Detroit the week prior.

On the year, Timmons has 28 tackles (23 solo) with three sacks.

Timmons made a number of big plays for the Steelers defense in 2008 despite being a backup. He was a major factor in the Steelers' Week 15 victory over the Baltimore Ravens in 2008. Timmons finished with six tackles against the Ravens, including a 14-yard sack in the fourth quarter that knocked Baltimore out of field goal range.

Timmons, who saw action in base defensive packages and the nickel package, had 71 tackles in 2008 to go with his five sacks. He had a career-best two sacks in the Steelers' Week 7 victory at Cincinnati.

Fox Trot: LB Keyaron Fox posted his first career interception and first career touchdown in the Steelers' Week 7 victory over the Minnesota Vikings.

Fox picked off a QB Brett Favre pass with one minute remaining and returned it 82 yards for a touchdown to seal the Steelers' victory. He was inserted into the game due to an earlier injury to starting LB Lawrence Timmons. The 82-yard interception return for a touchdown was the fourth-longest (tied) in the regular season in team history.

Fox started in place of the injured Timmons in the first two games this year and did not disappoint. They were his first and second starts as a Steeler and the fifth and sixth starts of his career (four with Kansas City).

Fox finished with a team-high nine tackles (six solo) and recovered his first career fumble in the Week 1 victory over the Tennessee Titans.

Fox has 17 tackles (11 solo) on the year and 12 special teams tackles.

Man Of Troy: SS Troy Polamalu, who missed four straight weeks with a knee injury (Weeks 2-5), returned to action in Week 6 and immediately had an impact on the game.

Against the Browns in Week 6, Polamalu posted his second interception of the season.

Polamalu came out on fire in the Steelers' Week 1 victory over the Tennessee Titans before leaving with a knee injury in the second quarter.

Polamalu was noticeably in on a number of plays in Week 1, finishing with five tackles (all solo), one interception and two pass defenses. He added one tackle for loss before leaving with his knee injury.

Polamalu now has 19 career interceptions and the Steelers are 15-3 when Polamalu has an interception.

Polamalu had one of the finest seasons of his career in 2008, posting a career-high seven interceptions among a number of big plays. He had an interception in a career-high four straight games (Weeks 12-15).

Polamalu's seven interceptions, which finished second (tied) in the NFL, were the most for the Steelers since Willie Williams had seven picks in 1995.

Polamalu, who also had a three-game streak with an interception to start the 2008 season, had 87 tackles on the year, including 61 solo, to rank fourth on the team.

Clark Delivering: S Ryan Clark is third on the team with 44 total tackles this year and is tied for the team lead with two interceptions.

Clark has posted an interception in consecutive weeks (Weeks 5-6) and is tied with S Troy Polamalu for the team lead.

Clark finished the 2008 season with 113 tackles, including a season-high 12 in Week 16 at Tennessee, and eight passes defended. His 113 tackles were a career high and ranked second on the team despite missing the Week 9 matchup against his former team, the Washington Redskins, and the season finale versus Cleveland with a shoulder injury.

Face Me Ike: CB Ike Taylor has started 40 straight games at cornerback for the Steelers and he's picked up where he left off in 2008.

Taylor has a team-best nine pass breakups this year after posting a club-high 14 pass breakups last year.

Gay Gearing Up: CB William Gay is in his first full season as the starting cornerback and ranks second on the team with 46 total tackles. He had a career-high 10 tackles in Week 2 at Chicago.

In Week 5 at Detroit, Gay posted one sack (first of his career) and finished with eight tackles.

Gay made four straight starts in 2008, ranking second (tied) on the team with 11 pass breakups.

Gay had 38 tackles in 2008 and posted nine special teams tackles in his first season of significant playing time.

Young At Heart: CB Deshea Townsend is in his 12th year in the NFL and continues to be a major factor in the Steelers defensive success.

Townsend had arguably the biggest play of his career in the Week 14 victory over the Dallas Cowboys in 2008. With the score tied at 13-13 with less than two minutes remaining, Townsend picked off a Tony Romo pass and returned it 25 yards for the go-ahead touchdown. It marked his third career interception return for a score. For his efforts, he was named GMC Sierra Defensive Player of the Week (Week 14).

INDIVIDUAL SPECIAL TEAMS NOTES

Chart Topper: K Jeff Reed owns the team's second-best all-time mark for career field goal percentage.

Reed is 171-of-208 (.822) for his career in the regular season, which is second in team history. Former K Norm Johnson finished his career with the Steelers making 105-of-127 field goal attempts, an .827 career field goal percentage.

Getting His Kicks: K Jeff Reed is a perfect 20-for-20 in PATs and is 9-for-12 in field goals this year for a team-high 47 points.

Last year, Reed was 36-for-37 on PATs and 27-for-31 in FGs for a team-best 117 points. His 117 points in 2008 tied for the second-most in his career, matching his 2005 total of 117 points.

Reed's performance in 2008 was that much more impressive considering his adjustment to both a new holder and new long-snapper midway through the season. He set a career long when he booted a 53-yard field goal in Week 3 at Philadelphia. It marked the fourth-longest (tied) field goal in team history.

Moving On Up: K Jeff Reed ranks second on the team's all-time scoring list with 780 career points.

Reed moved into second place on the team's all-time scoring list during the 2008 regular-season finale against the Cleveland Browns. He finished with seven points, giving him 733 for his career, which was second only to Gary Anderson (1,343).

Reed has 171 field goals (second in team history) and 267 PATs during his eight-year career with the Steelers. He is just the fourth

kicker in team history to boot at least 100 field goals in a career, joining Gary Anderson (309), Roy Gerela (146) and Norm Johnson (105), and just the third player in team history to reach 700 points (Anderson, Gerela).

Mr. Dependable: K Jeff Reed continues to be one of the most productive field goal kickers in the NFL. Reed's 131 field goals since the beginning of the 2004 season place him third among kickers who have kicked in at least one Pro Bowl since the beginning of the 2004 season.

Sepulveda Returns To Form: P Daniel Sepulveda has returned to action in 2009 on a tear after missing all of last year with a knee injury he suffered in training camp.

On the year, Sepulveda is averaging 44.8 yards per punt and has downed 10 of his 26 punts inside the 20-yard line. His 40.2 net punting average ranks fourth in the AFC and eighth in the NFL.

Sepulveda averaged 54.3 yards per punt in Week 2 at Chicago, posting a game-long 58-yarder.

Sepulveda finished with seven punts for 299 yards (42.7 avg.) in Week 1 versus Tennessee, downing four punts inside the 20-yard line in a game when field position was a struggle. He also added a 54-yard punt downed at the two-yard line following the first series of the game.

Sepulveda averaged 42.4 yards per punt as a rookie in 2007.

Logan's Run: KR/PR/WR Stefan Logan has made an immediate impact to the Steelers' return game, both as a punt returner and kick returner.

Logan is averaging 26.5 yards per kick return, which ranks seventh in the AFC and 12th in the NFL. He had a long of 56 yards against the Cincinnati Bengals in Week 3. Logan has helped the Steelers rank fifth in the NFL in average starting position on kickoffs (29.4).

Logan has averaged 7.5 yards per punt return this year as well.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers were powered by two fourth-quarter touchdowns from rookie **RB Isaac Redman** as they opened their 2009 preseason slate with a 20-10 victory over the Arizona Cardinals in a rematch of Super Bowl XLIII.

Neither team was able to muster much offense in the first half as both teams' first units played only two series each. Pittsburgh struck first midway through the second quarter. **K Jeff Reed** nailed a 50-yard field goal, set up in large part by a 45-yard pass completion down the right sideline from **QB Charlie Batch** to **WR Limas Sweed**.

Arizona tied the score at three on the final play of the half with a 29-yard field goal by K Neil Rackers. The Cardinals were given a free play because Steelers' **CB Anthony Madison** was called for pass interference on the previous play while making a sensational diving interception of a QB Matt Leinart pass.

The Steelers' 2009 rookie class took over in the second half. **CB Joe Burnett** intercepted Cardinals' QB Brian St. Pierre and returned the ball 42 yards to the three-yard line on the final play of the third quarter. Redman plunged into the end zone over right tackle on the first play of the fourth quarter for a 10-3 Steelers' advantage.

Pittsburgh struck again on their next offensive possession as **QB Dennis Dixon** led the team on a 12 play, 80-yard drive culminated with Redman's second rushing touchdown of the evening, this time from five yards out, to make it 17-3 in favor of the Steelers.

Arizona cut their deficit to 17-10 when QB Tyler Palko hit WR Onrea Jones for a 20-yard touchdown reception with 3:30 remaining in regulation. Pittsburgh closed the scoring following a 44-yard field goal by **K Piotr Czech**.

Dixon led the Steelers by completing 10-of-19 passes (52.6 pct.) for 112 yards and a passer rating of 70.5. Newcomer **WR Shaun McDonald** paced the receivers with six receptions for 69 yards (11.5 avg.) and Sweed posted two receptions for 56 yards (28.0 avg.). Redman finished with 10 rushing attempts for 32 yards (3.2 avg.) with two touchdowns.

The Steelers posted four sacks as **CB Keiwan Ratliff**, **LB LaMarr Woodley** and **DE Ziggy Hood** each collecting one sack, while **LB Arnold Harrison** and **DE Sonny Harris** combined for the other. Ratliff tied for the team lead in tackles with six (all solo), along with **LB James Harrison** (three solo).

LANDOVER, Md. — The Washington Redskins took advantage of a fourth-quarter fumble by the Steelers' **Joe Burnett** and turned the miscue into a game-winning 18-yard touchdown pass to give the Redskins a 17-13 victory. The loss dropped Pittsburgh's preseason record to 1-1.

The Steelers appeared to have the Redskins stopped after a three-and-out on the opening possession, but Washington RB Rock Cartwright converted a fake punt, running 15 yards to midfield to keep the Redskins in business. Washington drove to the Steelers two-yard line, but Steelers' **LB Keyaron Fox** stopped RB Ladell Betts for a one-yard loss, and the Redskins had to settle for a 20-yard field goal from K Shaun Suisham.

Backup **QB Charlie Batch**, who started for an injured **QB Ben Roethlisberger**, led the Steelers on a nine-play, 50-yard drive that resulted in the Steelers taking their first lead, 7-3, late in the first quarter. Batch twice completed deep passes on third down, the first a 16-yard strike to **WR Santonio Holmes**, followed by a 24-yard hookup with **WR Hines Ward**. **RB Willie Parker** punctuated the drive with a three-yard touchdown run on a toss to the right side.

Pittsburgh upped their lead to 10-3 when **K Jeff Reed** booted a 34-yard field goal. Reed had two opportunities seconds later to further increase that lead, but missed on 53 and 48-yard attempts as time expired. Reed was set up for those attempts after **CB Keiwan Ratliff** intercepted QB Todd Collins and returned the ball to the Washington 35-yard line.

Washington tied the score in the third quarter when Daniel teamed up with **WR Marko Mitchell** for a three-yard touchdown to make the score 10-10. Pittsburgh went back in front, 13-10, when **K Piotr Czech** nailed a 41-yard field goal.

The Steelers, behind back-to-back sacks by rookie **DE Ziggy Hood**, stopped Washington at midfield early in the fourth quarter, but Burnett fumbled the ensuing punt return, setting the Redskins up at the Steelers' 18-yard line following the recovery.

From there, it took Daniel only one play to find Davis behind the Steelers' secondary for the 18-yard touchdown reception, and a 17-13 Redskins lead that would hold up throughout.

QB Dennis Dixon led the Steelers offensively, completing 8-of-16 passes for 68 yards with a long of 18. Hood had both Steelers' sacks, giving him a team-leading three in the preseason. Ratliff and **LB Tom Korte** recorded the Steelers' two interceptions.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers' first units appear poised to pick up right where they left off in 2008 as they led the charge to a 17-0 blanking of the Buffalo Bills at Heinz Field. Pittsburgh improved their preseason record to 2-1 with the victory.

Pittsburgh dominated time of possession and total yards right from the opening drive. **QB Ben Roethlisberger** led the Steelers 50 yards to the Bills' 21-yard line, however a fumble by **RB Rashard Mendenhall** was recovered by Bills' LB Keith Ellison, stalling the drive.

The Steelers did strike first to take a 3-0 lead early in the second quarter when **K Piotr Czech**, filling in for the injured **K Jeff Reed**, converted a 34-yard field goal to cap a 13-play, 49-yard drive which saw Roethlisberger complete five-of-six passes for 41 yards.

Two plays later, on Buffalo's first play from scrimmage following the kickoff, Steelers' **LB James Farrior** stepped in front of the intended Bills' receiver for the interception and returned the ball 22 yards for the score and a quick 10-0 Steelers' advantage.

Mendenhall atoned for his earlier fumble 31 seconds before the first half was set to expire when he ran in untouched from four yards out to make the score 17-0 in favor of Pittsburgh. Roethlisberger again led the way through the air, this time completing five-of-seven passes for 74 yards.

After 30 minutes the Steelers had amassed 209 total yards compared to only 50 for the Bills, and they held a 21:46 to 8:14 time of possession advantage.

Neither team was able to put points on the board in the second half, although both teams had opportunities.

Czech missed a 40-yard attempt on the Steelers' opening possession of the half, while Buffalo's only chance to put points on the board was snuffed when Steelers' rookie **CB Joe Burnett** blocked Bills' K Rian Lindell's 33-yard field goal attempt with 2:58 remaining in the fourth quarter.

In only one half, Roethlisberger finished 15-of-19 (78.9 pct.) for 168 yards with a passer rating of 103.5. **WR Hines Ward** caught five passes for 74 yards (14.8 avg.), while Mendenhall led the ground attack with 48 yards on 16 attempts (3.0 avg.) with one touchdown.

Farrior had a huge night for the Steelers, tying for the team lead with four tackles (three solo), registering one sack, forcing a fumble, defending two passes and returning his interception 22 yards for a touchdown. **LB Donovan Woods** and **LB Arnold Harrison** combined for the Steelers' other sack.

PITTSBURGH — The Steelers' streak of consecutive victories on Kickoff Weekend stretched to seven with their 13-10 overtime defeat of the Tennessee Titans at Heinz Field.

The Steelers won the coin toss in overtime and **QB Ben Roethlisberger** made sure the Titans would never touch the football. On the winning drive he completed five-of-seven passes for 60 yards, the final strike a 22-yard completion over the middle to rookie **WR Mike Wallace**, before K Jeff Reed won the game with a 33-yard field goal.

Neither team scored in a first quarter which saw both teams exchange interceptions and Tennessee K Rob Bironas misfire on a 37-yard field goal attempt. Steelers' **S Troy Polamalu** hauled in a one-handed interception of a QB Kerry Collins pass intended for WR Kenny Britt while Titans' S Vincent Fuller returned the favor by intercepting Roethlisberger on the ensuing Steelers' possession.

Pittsburgh was able to strike first late in the second quarter. Roethlisberger led a five-play, 79-yard drive that included a 29-yard hookup with **WR Hines Ward** followed on the next play by a 34-yard touchdown strike to **WR Santonio Holmes**.

Tennessee answered the Steelers' score with one of their own 34 seconds later when Collins hit WR Justin Gage on a 14-yard touchdown toss to tie the score at 7-7. Gage's score was set up by a long 57-yard completion from Collins to Britt.

CHICAGO — The Chicago Bears capped a 10-point fourth quarter with K Robbie Gould converting a 44-yard field goal attempt with 15 seconds remaining in regulation to defeat the Pittsburgh Steelers 17-14 at Soldier Field. Pittsburgh fell to 1-1 on the season with the loss.

Pittsburgh stormed out of the gate early, forcing the Bears into a three-and-out on the opening possession of the game, and proceeding to drive the ball 92 yards in 13 plays before **QB Ben Roethlisberger** scrambled on fourth-and-one at the Chicago one-yard line and found **TE Matt Spaeth** open in the back of the end zone for a 7-0 Steelers' lead.

Roethlisberger completed 8-of-9 passes on the drive for 83 yards, including 24- and 19-yard hookups with **WR Santonio Holmes**, a 19-yard strike to **WR Hines Ward** and a 15-yard completion to **TE Heath Miller**.

The Steelers appeared to be poised to carry that lead into the half when rookie **CB Joe Burnett**, making his NFL debut, downed a 58-yard punt from **P Daniel Sepulveda** at the Bears' three-yard line. Bears QB Jay Cutler had other ideas as he marched the Bears 97 yards in 13 plays before hooking up with TE Kellen Davis for a six-yard touchdown reception with 19 seconds remaining in the first half to tie the score, 7-7.

Roethlisberger and the Steelers regained a seven-point advantage in the third quarter when the Steelers' signal-caller faked a handoff to **RB Rashad Mendenhall** and dove in the end zone around left end for a two-yard touchdown run to make the score 14-7 in favor of Pittsburgh. On the previous play, Mendenhall ran a career-high 39 yards to set up the score.

Chicago tied the score midway through the fourth quarter following a 38-yard missed field goal attempt by Steelers' **K Jeff Reed**. CINCINNATI — The Cincinnati Bengals overcame an 11-point fourth quarter deficit and defeated the Steelers, 23-20, on a late four-yard scoring strike from QB Carson Palmer to WR Andre Caldwell. The loss dropped the Steelers' record to 1-2.

Pittsburgh looked dominant in the first quarter, scoring on each of their first three possessions en route to a 13-0 lead. After one quarter of play the Steelers outgained the Bengals 143 yards to minus-10.

The Steelers forced Cincinnati into a three-and-out on their opening drive then proceeded to march the ball all the way to the Bengals' one-yard line before the drive stalled and **K Jeff Reed** connected on a 19-yard field goal for a 3-0 Steelers' lead.

Pittsburgh's lead grew to 13-0 when **QB Ben Roethlisberger** found **RB Willie Parker** for a 27-yard touchdown pass and Reed converted another field goal from 24 yards.

Cincinnati finally got on the board late in the first half after they forced the Steelers to turn the ball over on downs at the Cincinnati 35-yard line. The Bengals moved the ball 49 yards in seven plays before K Shayne Graham nailed a 34-yard field goal to cut the Steelers' lead to 13-3 at the half.

The Bengals chipped at the Steelers' lead when CB Jonathan Joseph intercepted a Roethlisberger pass and went 30 yards untouched for a defensive score. Cincinnati missed the extra point but got to within four points, 13-9.

Roethlisberger put the Steelers ahead, 20-9, as he plunged into the end zone on a QB sneak from one-yard out with three minutes to play in the third.

Bengals' RB Cedric Benson gave the Bengals their first offensive score of the afternoon when he scored on a 23-yard run to make the score 20-15. Cincinnati's two-point attempt failed.

After Cincinnati stopped the Steelers with 5:26 to play in regulation, they went on a 16-play, 71-yard drive that took up five minutes and ended with Palmer finding Caldwell for a four-yard touchdown reception. Palmer's two-point pass completion to RB Brian Leonard made it 23-20 Cincinnati, and the Bengals had completed the comeback.

Roethlisberger completed 22-of-31 passes (71.0 pct.) for 276 yards with one touchdown and one interception. PITTSBURGH — Pittsburgh snapped a two-game losing streak and held off a fiery San Diego team by posting a 38-28 victory over the Chargers at Heinz Field. The win improved the Steelers record to 2-2.

Pittsburgh controlled the game throughout both on the ground and in the air. The Steelers jumped out to a 14-0 first quarter lead when **RB Rashard Mendenhall**, filling in for injured **RB Willie Parker**, scored from one yard out and RB Mewelde Moore hauled in a 19-yard strike from **QB Ben Roethlisberger** later in the quarter.

The Steelers upped their lead to 21-0 at the half when Mendenhall scored his second touchdown of the game with less than two minutes remaining in the second quarter.

Pittsburgh stretched its lead to 28-0 midway through the third quarter when **TE Heath Miller** made an over-the-shoulder catch for a six-yard touchdown from Roethlisberger.

San Diego began to chip away at the lead as QB Philip Rivers hit TE Antonio Gates for a three-yard score in the third quarter and FB Jacob Hester returned a fumbled punt 41 yards for a score early in the fourth to make it 28-14.

The Steelers responded and took a 35-14 lead with 7:18 left in the game as Moore tossed a six-yard pass to Miller in the back of the end zone.

Once again, the Chargers made it interesting and narrowed the gap to 35-28 with a pair of touchdowns over a two-minute span with less than five minutes remaining in the game.

K Jeff Reed sealed the Steelers' victory with a 46-yard field goal with 43 seconds remaining, giving Pittsburgh the 10-point win.

Pittsburgh outgained the Chargers, 497-251, in total offense (177-16 in rushing yards).

Mendenhall finished with a career-high 165 yards rushing on 29 carries (5.7 avg.) with two touchdowns. Roethlisberger was 26-for-33 for 333 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions (128.9 passer rating) while **WR Hines Ward** caught eight passes for 113 yard (14.1 avg.).

DETROIT — The Pittsburgh Steelers held off a late rally by the Detroit Lions and captured their second straight victory of the season with a 28-20 at Ford Field. The win improved the Steelers record to 3-2 and it was the Steelers first road win for the season.

The Lions struck first by marching down the field by scoring a 46-yard field goal by K Jason Hanson. The Steelers wasted no time to retaliate with a 78-drive that was culminated with a seven-yard rush by **RB Rashard Mendenhall**.

Detroit attempted to take the lead again in the first quarter, however, they sufficed with a 46-yard field goal again by Hanson to make the game 7-6.

PITTSBURGH — The Pittsburgh Steelers captured their 12th straight win against the Cleveland Browns with a 27-14 victory at Heinz Field. The Steelers improved to 4-2 on the year.

Both teams got off to a slow start, but Pittsburgh's **QB Ben Roethlisberger** picked up the pace in the second quarter by throwing two touchdowns before the half. **TE Heath Miller** caught an eight-yard touchdown pass by Roethlisberger and **WR Hines Ward** caught a season-long 52 yard touchdown pass from Roethlisberger.

The Browns struck back with a 98-yard kickoff return from WR Josh Cribbs on the ensuing kickoff to trim the lead to 14-7, but the Steelers retaliated with a 32-yard field goal from **K Jeff Reed** to end the half.

In the second half, Cleveland started with a six-play, 66-yard drive which ended in a touchdown pass from QB Derek Anderson to FB Lawrence Vickers to make the contest a three-point game, 17-14.

RB Rashard Mendenhall helped stretch the lead to 24-14 with a two-yard touchdown run on the next drive and the Steelers' defense shut out the Browns the rest of the game.

Reed capped with scoring with a 39-yard field goal in the fourth quarter.

Roethlisberger finished 23-for-35 with 417 yards, two touchdowns and one interception (133.6 passer rating). His 417 yards passing are the second-most for Roethlisberger and were the third-highest passing total in team history. It also marks his 31st career 100-plus passer rating game (113.6), which tied him with Hall of Fame quarterback Terry Bradshaw for the most in team history.

Ward finished with eight catches for 159 yards (19.9 avg.) with one touchdown. His 159 yards are the third-highest in his career and it also marks his 23rd career 100-yard receiving game (third of the season).

WR Santonio Holmes caught five catches for 104 yards (20.8 avg.) with a long of 41 yards. This game marked his second 100-yard receiving game this season and sixth in his career in the regular season.

S Troy Polamalu and **S Ryan Clark** intercepted the Browns' Anderson giving the Steelers two interceptions. **LB Lawrence Timmons** also chipped in with two sacks for 16 yards and forced two fumbles on the Browns' quarterback.

However on the ensuing kickoff, WR Percy Harvin broke away for an 88-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to make it 20-17 with six minutes remaining in the game.

Following a Steelers' punt on their next drive, the Vikings regained possession and marched to the Pittsburgh 19-yard line and appeared to be ready to tie the game or take the lead. **LB Keyaron Fox** made sure that didn't happen as he picked off a Favre pass and returned it 82 yards with one minute remaining in the game for his first career touchdown that sealed the victory.

Pittsburgh was outgained in the victory, 386-259, but made the big plays when it counted. The Steelers finished with four sacks, two by **LB James Harrison**, one interception, one forced fumble and two defensive scores. **LB James Farrior** posted a game-high 15 tackles for Pittsburgh.
